WOULD AID TRAFFIC.—The travelling public of Orwell Cove and vicinity are agitating among themselves for a long felt want and that is for a proposed traffic bridge starting at the main road terminus at Brush Point across the river to "Sullivan's Point" a distance of about 400 yards more or less. By the building of this bridge it would be easier and cheaper for the travelling public of Orwell and the surrounding Southern districts as it would lessen the distance to Charlottetown by 20 miles and also during the winter season it would shorten the distance of travelling to the Vernon R.R. Station by at least 10 miles and in like proportion to the Northern public.—O.

SCHOOL EXAMINATION.—The semi-annual examination of White Sands School took place on the afternoon of Friday, June 29th in the presence of about thirty nine school-owners and trustees. The school-room presented a very pretty appearance with the bright, animated faces of the children contrasting most pleasantly with the profusion of plotted plants, and iliacs which filled the windows. The pupils were examined in the various subjects by the teacher, Mr. Miss Coyle, assisted by Miss Stewart, teacher at High Bank, and showed by their ready answers, that they had been well taught. Then followed a programme of recitations, choruses, etc., which were much appreciated by those present. There were also three compositions on "The School Garden" and these formed a pleasing feature of the programme. Among the interested visitors was Inspector Adams, who has always taken a keen interest in matters pertaining to school work. There were three pupils whose attendance was remarkably good during the year, viz. Eugene Glover who was never absent a day during the school year, Stewart Clements who was absent one day during the school year, and Florence Clements who was absent two days during the school year. Prizes were awarded these pupils by the teacher. Inspector Adams on being informed of their regularity at school during the year, also kindly presented them with a prize in money. Visitors and parents then formed up on the school ground, when the pupils executed their Physical Drill exercises under the direction of the teacher. There followed a most pleasing feature. Table cloths were spread, and delicious ice cream and cake provided by the good ladies of the settlement were quickly dispatched. Everybody enjoyed themselves to the utmost. It was indeed a fitting close to an afternoon of pleasure and comradeship. The people of White Sands take a great pride in their school and its surroundings, and this is what is needed in every school district that wishes an up-to-date school. It is great encouragement to teachers when the ratepayers co-operate with them for the upbuilding of their school. The people of White Sands are always ready and willing to help financially and otherwise in school matters and were quite willing to vote \$50 for the present teacher for the coming year. This is certainly commendable, and shows the interest taken in education in this district. The pupils presented the teacher with a sum of money, who although taken by surprise heartily thanked the children for their thoughtfulness.
