IN MEMORIAM

MR. STANLEY H. CASELEY

The people of Kensington and vicinity were shocked to learn of the passing of Stanley H. Caseley, one of the most highly respected citizens of the community.

Until two weeks before his death he was up and around about his work when he contracted a cold which developed into pneumonia and in spite of all that human hands could do he was called to his heavenly home on January 31.

His death at the comparatively early age of 54 years came as a great shock to his friends and neighbors and especially to his immediate family.

The deceased was born in Kensington, a son of the late Samuel Caseley of that place. He leaves to mourn their great loss, his widow, nee Winnifred Johnson, three daughters, Elva, Mrs. Arthur Cornish, Howlan, Irene, Mrs. Gordon Mallett, Charlottetown, Mary, Mrs. Harold Fauner, Howlan, and eight grandchildren. Also three sisters and one brother, Mrs. Jean McLeod, Coleman, Mrs. George Barbour, Charlottetown, Mrs. Alex McLaughlin, Albert, and Edward Caseley of Wilnot.

The high esteem in which the departed and family are held was manifested by the large concourse of people who gathered for the funeral which was held in the United Church, Kensington, on Feb. 2. Rev. A. D. Sterling, his pastor, conducted the service, assisted by Rev. E. J. O. Fraser of the Marquet Church. In the course of his address Mr. Sterling paid a beautiful tribute to the character of the deceased.

Of a quiet home-loving nature Mr. Caseley was always ready to lend a helping hand, never thinking of himself but always of others and as a friend and father he will be greatly missed. A faithful member of the United Church, a member of the choir, also of the Board of Stewards. His place will be hard to fill.

This life so recently ended here has indeed run a good race, had kept the faith and had now entered into his just reward.

50-Year-Old Woman North Sea Skipper

WHITBY, England, Feb. 8. (CP) - A middle-aged Englishwoman, Dora Walker, whose doctor told her she needed some salt air, went down to the sea in a fishing ship to become Britain's first woman skipper.

Skipper Walker, now 50, has for four years been defying German planes, submarines and mines in the North Sea. Ordered ashore recently by her doctor, she is confident the day isn't far away when England will need her again.

"They will need small craft, some - and people who can handle them," she said at her Yorkshire cottage within sound of the North Sea breakers. "That will be my day - you wait and see."

Pre-Enlistment Pay For CWAC's

OTTAWA, Feb. 8. (CP) - The defence department announced today a pre-enlistment allowance of \$1.05 a day will be paid all volunteers for the Canadian Women's Army Corps from the time of arrival at a reception centre until attestation or rejection.

The allowance equals the basic rate of pay for G.W.A.C. privates and puts women on an equal footing with servicemen, who have been receiving a pre-enlistment allowance.

Under the ruling, transportation from the applicant's home to the reception centre will be furnished and meals provided en route. Meals and lodging, or an allowance to cover these items will also be provided while the recruit is at the reception centre. These benefits apply whether or not the application is accepted.

If accepted, the recruit may, following attestation, be given a brief leave without pay, in which case she will be furnished with a return trip travel warrant.

Dieppe Awards Announced

OTTAWA, Feb. 8. (CP) - Defence headquarters announced today the awards of the Croix De Guerre to one officer and three other ranks of the Canadian active army for bravery and gallantry in the Dieppe raid in August, 1942. The awards, made by the fighting French in London, were:

Croix De Guerre with Bronze Palm Maj. Frederick St. Clair Wilkinson, 40 of Hamilton, second-in-command of a central Ontario Regiment at Dieppe, who returned to Canada last March. Maj. Wilkinson previously was mentioned in dispatches for his part in the raid.

Croix De Guerre with Vermillion Star Sgt. Leslie Ellwood Scobie, 25, of Highland Park, Mich., member of a western Ontario Regiment and a native of Ottawa.

Acting L. Sgt. Clive Ward, 34, of Gainsboro, Sask., member of a Saskatchewan Regiment, who previously was mentioned in dispatches for his part in the raid.

Croix De Guerre with Silver Star Pte. Joseph Noel, 32, of Montreal and Jaquet River, N.B.; member of a Quebec Regiment. (Noel's award was announced in London Monday.)

Pte. Noel's citation: "Detailed as number 1 on a light machine-gun, he handled his weapon with skill and boldness during the move across the Dieppe beach. After his section leader had become a casualty, he assumed command of the section and after rallying his men, pressed on the attack. When ordered to withdraw he brought his men back to the landing craft and covered their embarkation until his light machine-gun was smashed by enemy fire. Pte. Noel, though wounded shortly after landing, refused to have his wounds dressed until his section had returned to the landing craft. His cheerfulness and calmness throughout were an inspiration to his comrades."



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
