Earl Grady, Summerside, spent Sunday in this city.

Mrs. Samuel Clow, New Haven, has returned home after spending a few days with her sister, Mrs. Thos. Henderson, Long Creek.

Miss Myrtle Henderson, Long Creek, who has been operated on for appendicitis, is recovering rapidly under the skillful nursing of Miss M. V. Burgess, Charlottetown.

The tug William Aitken is to return after towing the dredge Montague to Alberton to take up the scows. She will then again return to this port and proceed to Pashebieac, N. S.

The city market Friday was well attended and a small amount of produce was handled for local consumption. The prices, which remained the same as when last quoted, appear itemized elsewhere in this issue.

William Brady, son of Benj. P. Brady, city, who is now located in London, Ont., is visiting his former home. Mr. Brady was summoned home on account of the illness and death of his brother, Arthur, but arrived too late to attend the funeral. He leaves on return on Wednesday or Thursday.

A number of persons interested in Christian Missions assembled in St. Paul's Schoolroom Thursday evening to hear Miss Shaw and Rev. W. A. Cotton talk about the successful missions of the Church of England in Japan and in South Africa. Rev. Canon Simpson occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Cotton was first called upon. He very briefly referred to the life and work of the Society of the Resurrection, of which he is a member, and went on to state the facts as to their work among the Kafir miners and the meetings in the vicinity of the Rand. When invited eight years ago by the Synod and Bishop of Johannesburg to enter upon the work, there were but one European priest and three or four native catechists. Now there are, in the district occupied by the Community of the Resurrection—about five thousand square miles around Johannesburg—six European priests, five native deacons, sixty native catechists and about 100 churches, with many day schools—while in the whole Diocese there are sixteen European clergy, two native priests, ten native deacons and nearly three hundred churches and congregations. The whole costs \$40,000 a year, and of this amount that half is supplied by the native themselves. Miss Shaw's vivid descriptions, of the work in Osaka, Japan, were illustrated by photographic views in the English Church Mission school established there, in the city itself, and in the beautiful country round about. Miss Shaw conveyed to her hearers a clear idea of how the work was being done, and how one and another were by the Missionaries gradually brought from the darkness of Buddhism into the clear light of the gospel of Jesus Christ. She spoke with the freedom and power of one who had been there herself and was familiar with conditions in the Japan. Canon Simpson conveyed to the speakers the thanks of the audience and requested the prayers and sympathy and active work of all on behalf of the missions.
