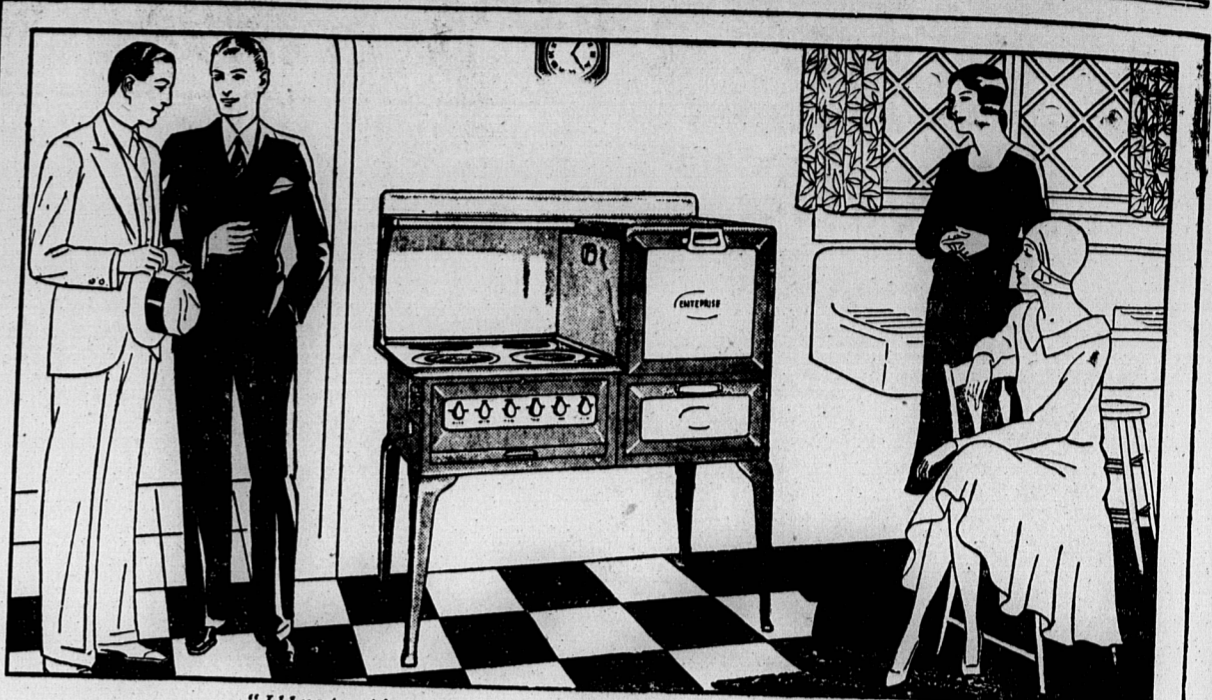

A South African Veteran

THE LATE MR. A. C. McNEILL

A recent letter has brought to this Province particulars of the death and funeral of Mr. A. C. McNeill, formerly of Victoria West, one of the South African War Veterans and Great War Veterans who had distinguished service in both wars. Mr. McNeill was born in 1879 and was just in his 50th year when he volunteered for service in South Africa, leaving with the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles, which brought so much distinction and honor upon themselves and the Province generally. He served during the Boer War and on the cessation of hostilities decided to remain in that great and glorious country. He joined the Cape Police at Mafeking in 1902 and had a successful career in its service. He was early promoted to an important position in Kimberley, and his general abilities and initiative resulted in his being transferred there to the Criminal Investigation Department, where he served until 1914. On his own application he returned to the outside regular force and was regarded as one of the best officers in the

Diamond city. He earned the reputation of being a friend and helpmate rather than a sleuth of those who had taken the downward path, and these were always certain of finding a friend and counsellor in him. Many a fallen one owed restoration to his kindly advice, sympathy and assistance. Though a giant in physique, he always treated criminals in a considerate and gentle manner. He took a great interest in boxing, of which he was a past master. On the outbreak of the Great War, Mr. McNeill was among the first to again offer his services to the Empire, and took part in the campaign in East Africa. At the end of the War he rejoined the South African Police and served for some years, resigning with a first-class character and pension. During the past year Mr. McNeill suffered greatly from a malignant disease, surrounded by friends and comrades. His funeral took place to the West End Cemetery and was very largely attended. Service was conducted by the Rev. J. Beresford Pierce, and the deceased was granted military, as well time. Two other brothers, John B. and Leslie McNeill reside in Pitts-

Intosh, ex-Sergeant Mr. and Mrs. J. Grant, Detective Head Constable G. W. Gunter, and Detective G. Scott. Among the other mourners were His Worship the Mayor (Alderman G. W. Williams), Detective Head Constable S. Roberts (Diamond Detective Department) and a number of Sergeants and Ex-Sergeants of the South African Police Force. Many wreaths and floral tributes were received, and a special car conveyed them to the cemetery.

Mr. McNeill was unmarried, and survived by his father Joseph A. McNeill formerly of Cavendish, but for the past thirty four years a resident of Boston, and step-mother, three brothers, and two aunts, Mrs. Robert Campbell of this city, and Mrs. Wm C McNeill, Brackley Pt. His youngest brother, Gordon, went overseas with the 98th Siege Battery from Charlottetown and made the supreme sacrifice in August, 1917 and another, J. Addison McNeill gained distinction as a dispatch rider. His picture and an account of his special services appeared in the English Press at the time. The chief mourn-g.
