## AUDITOR GEN'L AT NINETY TWO

### And no Vacation in Thirty Years - New Brunswicker Drowned in B.C.

FREDERICTON N. B. June 1 - (Special) - Auditor General Beer today celebrated his ninety-second birthday.

He was born in County Cork, Ireland, and arrived in St. John in a sailing vessel in June, 1824. He came to Fredericton next day and has since resided here.

He was appointed Legislative Librarian in 1864 and Auditor General three years later.

He has not been absent from his office a day for a long time and it is thirty years since he has taken a vacation.

Word is received that Roy Demmons, son of Rufus Demmons the well-known Chipman lumberman, was drowned on Friday last in one of the rivers of the Northern part of British Columbia.

The telegram contained no particulars of the sad tragedy except to say that the body had been recovered and would be sent home for interment.

## MORE ABOUT THE BOMB THROWING

MADRID, May 31 - The following is a list of those killed by the bomb which was thrown at the Royal carriage today during the progress of the wedding procession:

Captain Barres, commanding part of the king's escort.  
Lieut. Reysient.  
Lieut. Prandergerast.  
Six soldiers.

The Marquis de Celosa. Her daughter, Don Antonio Calvo. His niece, aged six years.  
Jose Sola, 70 years of age.  
Luis Fonseca.

The royal coach was brought to a sudden stop by the shock, officers and soldiers of the escort falling to the ground about the quarry and horses that had been killed. The screams of the terrified multitude mingled with the groans of the dying. It was immediately seen that the royal coach was intact except as it had been damaged by flying splinters. King Alfonso immediately alighted and assisted Queen Victoria out of the carriage. Then they entered another coach and were driven swiftly to the palace.

All this happened so quickly that people away from the immediate vicinity were not aware of the tragedy that had been enacted and continued to acclaim their sovereigns. Soon, however, they discovered the empty royal coach with two horses missing and the others spattered with blood, several of them bleeding from wounds. The groans and drivers looked deathly pale in their spangled uniforms.

Then came a boy shouting that a bomb had been thrown at the king. The appearance of the king and queen in a coach brought out delicious questions as the fact was recognized that the sovereigns had been spared.

A HORRIBLE SPECTACLE. In the meantime the scene of the tragedy presented a horrible spectacle with dead men and horses lying about, literally torn to pieces. Intense excitement prevailed, the mob invading the streets while the forces of the guards sought to maintain order and block the approaching streets. The bodies were wrapped up in blankets and removed on litters while the wounded were carried to hospitals in ambulances. The pavement was literally covered with blood and the upper stories of the building were spattered with it.

When the police surrounded the house from which the bomb was thrown the man attempted to flee, but was captured. Another man escaped over the roofs of houses.

According to an official statement it is not known whether one or more bombs were thrown. The statement continues that it is impossible to ascertain at present the author of the outrage, though it is known that a Catalonian named Manuel Daura took an apartment in the house from which the bomb was thrown, May 22, paying in advance with a 500 peseta bill. He was well dressed, of elegant appearance and showed a fondness for flowers.

Immediately following the royal coach came the bride's party, forming another glittering array of rich coaches bearing the lords and ladies in waiting and the prince and princesses of the House of Battenberg, and finally came the famed madonnas with the radiant bride, Princess Victoria, attended by her mother and Queen Maria Christina.

As the cortège entered the Puerta del Sol, the picture presented was strikingly repeated with the brilliant robes with which the brides are dressed in Spain, and the bridesmaids in white and gold.

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## LORD'S DAY BILL NOW REPORTED

### Provides for Necessary Work And Liberally Protects Adventists and Jews

OTTAWA, June 1 - (Special) - The special committee which has for some weeks been wrestling with the Lord's Day bill brought down its report this afternoon.

Among the things which will be allowed on the Sabbath day are the conveyance of mails and travellers, loading and unloading of boats, transfer of merchandise at intermediate points, maintenance of fire for industries, or to supply water, gas or electricity.

Railways will be allowed to clear snow off their tracks and work will be allowed on the Government canals and in railway yards.

Work will also be permitted on Monday newspapers after 9 p.m., on Sunday.

It will be lawful to deliver milk and food for domestic purposes.

Loading and unloading of ocean boats to enable them to call on scheduled time permissible.

Loading and unloading of inland craft will be permitted only to prevent their being caught in ice at the close of navigation.

The bill as amended also provides that Seventh Day Adventists and Hebrews will be allowed to work on Sunday provided that in so doing they do not disturb others in worship.

The report is accompanied by a recommendation from Mr. Fitzpatrick that Sunday transportation of grain east, and of empty west will be allowed on Sunday from September 15 to the close of navigation, and that the Railway Commission be given authority to make Sunday exemptions in regard to other railway work which they regard as necessary.

The debate on western lands was continued by Tariff, Liberal, and Bennett Conservatives.

## ACQUITTED OF MURDER CHARGE

NEW YORK, June 1 - (Special) - Josephine Terranova this afternoon was acquitted of the murder of her aunt, Concetta Riggs for which she has been on trial for several weeks.

She was, however, not released being remanded to the Tombs to answer to the charge of murdering her uncle who was killed at the same time as his wife.

The verdict was more surprising from the fact that the killing was admitted. Judge Scott in his charge instructed the jury that in default of justification, which was said had not been advanced, and there being little evidence of the abuse alleged as an excuse except the prisoner's own testimony, they should properly find a verdict of murder in the first degree.

On reaching the chamber of deputies the cortège came in sight of the church of St. Jerome at Real, which was magnificently adorned for the ceremony.

A waiting the bridal party stood lines of halberdiers and palace guards. The massed bands played the Spanish national anthem as the bridal couple passed within the church.

A SCENE OF BRAUTY. The interior of the church presented a scene of rare beauty as the royal couple entered. The great arches and nave, usually sombre, were lighted up by thousands of electric lights, which lined the cornices and framed the marble altars with an aureole light.

At the left of the altar arose a throne upon a raised dais upon which hung a canopy of light silk, wrought with gold embroideries. At the back of the throne flamed the arms of Spain. Richly gilded armchairs occupied the dais upon which sat the bride and groom.

AN IMPOSING CEREMONY. As the royal couple entered the assembly arose and two hundred choristers sang a processionary march. The king looked happy and slightly pale, as usual. Across the breast of his field marshal's uniform was the blue and white sash of the Order of Charles III, and on his breast sparkled the Order of the Garter and of the Golden Fleece.

The bride entered with her mother, brother and Queen Christina, the silver subsidiary of the wedding dress being replaced by the myriad of lights until she seemed to be robed in jewels, her veil slightly drawn aside, revealed her clear, fine features with cheeks full of youthful color.

MONROTON, June 1 - (Special) - The inter-collegiate sports here today resulted in a victory for Acadia, which was forty-two out of a possible ninety points.

Mr. Allison stood second with twenty nine and the University of N.B. third with 19.

Howe of Acadia broke the inter-collegiate and Maritime record for hurdles, winning in sixteen and three fifths.

Two other intercollegiate records were broken, the two twenty-yard dash by Black of Mt. Allison and the mile run by Atkinson of Mt. Allison.

## SOME CABINET CHANGES NEAR

OTTAWA, June 1 - (Special) - It is understood that Mr. Fitzpatrick will be sworn in Chief Justice on Monday and that Mr. Belcourt will be Solicitor General in place of M. Lemieux who will become Postmaster General in place of Mr. Aylesworth who becomes Minister of Justice.

## ELECTORS MEET IN WARD ONE

A meeting of the electors of Ward 1 was held last night to discuss civic matters particularly the recent increase in the taxes. J. W. Hodgson was called to the chair, and R. Macdonald was appointed secretary. The meeting was addressed by David Small, R. B. Norton, J. P. Tanton, P. McCourt, F. McCairon, H. Rankin, and John Johnston.

The following resolution was moved by David Small and seconded by James Barratt:

Resolved that this meeting disapproves the action of the City Council in increasing salaries of city officials and voting moneys as grants and gratuities to outside parties and corporations and severely condemn any increase of taxes for any such purpose of paying such appropriations and further resolved that Councillor Reddin the representative of this (ward one) be requested and pledged to vote against any and every attempt on the part of the Council to pass any vote for such moneys or to increase the taxes for any such purpose or purposes.

Most of the speeches made were made in line with the sentiment of the above resolution, with perhaps the exception of Mr. McCourt. Mr. Johnston attacked the Press of Charlottetown, which he vigorously denounced. His qualifications as a judge in this matter might furnish employment for the next Sherlock Holmes.

The following resolution was moved by Captain John Gillis, and seconded by Patrick Murnaghan:

Resolved that His Worship the Mayor be requested to call a public meeting in the Market Hall, giving ample time to have the same duly advertised, for the purpose of discussing the tax question and other city matters.

The following resolution was moved by James Hennessey, and seconded by Patrick Murnaghan:

Resolved that a committee of five persons be appointed to co-operate with similar committees if appointed by the other ward meetings for the purpose of carrying out the effect of this meeting, and of taking such measures as may be necessary to protect the interest of taxpayers.

All the resolutions were unanimously agreed to. After passing a vote of thanks to the chairman the meeting adjourned.
