The following factories boarded cheese: Kensington, 550; Stanley Bridge, 311; New Glasgow, 300; Winsloe, 100; Emerald, 300; Hazelbrook, 110; New Perth, 250; Union, 170; Orwell, 200; Red House, 80; Cornwall, 120; St. Peter's, 63; Red Point, 65; New Dominion, 60; Lakeville, 100; Gowan Brae, 80. Total number of cheese boarded, 2,859. All factories, except New Glasgow and Winsloe, sold to Mr. Spillett at 104. A request was made that shippers be more careful in packing their cheese boxes in cars, as complaint has been made that the boxes are packed so high that they are knocked over in transit and become damaged. The next meeting is on Friday, July 22.

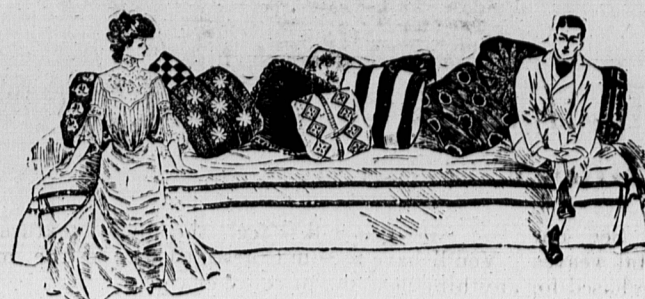
