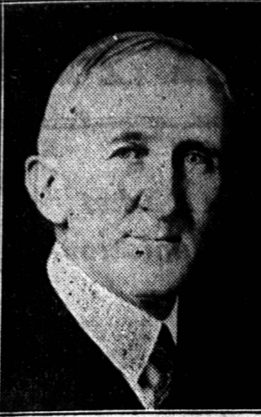

**THE MODERN BOY CALLED A COWARD**  
LONDON, Aug. 4.—Cuthbert Blakiston, a widely known educator, shocked Great Britain today by denouncing the modern boy as timid, cowardly, untruthful, easily bored, vain and dishonest.  
Mr. Blakiston, headmaster of Lancing College, one of the nation's famous public schools, voiced all this criticism in a speech before the British Medical Association.  
His talk caused a sensation, for England for centuries has been proud of her public school boys. Nowadays, he said, youths are described as the rocks upon which the great empire was founded. The nation has verily believed that "Waterloo was won on the playing fields at Eton."  
Scare head lines were put over the headmaster's speech by the afternoon newspapers.  
Mr. Blakiston said there was no comparison between the boys of today and those of thirty years ago. The keen, adventurous outdoor sportsmen of other days have been replaced, he asserted, by youths who do not know how to saddle a horse and who deck themselves out like peacocks so they will look pretty.  
It is his belief that the old spirit of adventure is largely gone and initiative is considerably impaired. Nowadays, he said, youths are unwilling to go abroad to seek their fortune.  
Mr. Blakiston blamed the war for it all.
