RIBS FRACTURED.—Many admirers of Mr. "Jack" Gordon, the Abegweit's star cover were disappointed when he did not come on the ice with his team Tuesday night. The reason for his non-appearance, however, was on account of an injury he received in the game between the Abegweits and Crystals in which he got two ribs fractured. It is hoped that he will be sufficiently recovered to participate in the next match in Charlottetown.

THE WEATHER.—The weather must certainly have signed an agreement at the beginning of the winter to give Charlottetown a chance to atmospheric surroundings at least once in twelve hours, for that is the way it has been behaving. During the day the temperature recorded as high as 37 degrees above zero and at nine Wednesday evening it had dropped to 17 above, a difference of 20 degrees in less than a day. Thursday morning the mercury has again ascended the thermometer reaching a point of 12 degrees above. The previous evening it descended to 10 degrees above. But variety of temperature is not the only trick the weather is playing us. One day citizens are permitted to walk along the streets in an upright, natural manner but the next, or perhaps the same evening the walks will be covered with water and of course slippery causing many a tumble.

SUPREME COURT PROCEEDINGS.—In the Supreme Court on Wednesday His Lordship Chief Justice Sullivan delivered judgment in the case brought by Francis Collins against George Keenan which was tried before His Lordship and a jury on Friday. This action arose out of an assault which took place on board the steamer Earl Grey at Pictou, N. S., in March last, when Keenan assaulted Collins with a shovel. Considerable evidence had been given, including that of the Captain, the first mate and other employees of the Earl Grey, who were all examined on behalf of the defendant. The defence was that the assault was committed in self-defence, but the plaintiff argued that even if it was in self defence the assault was unjustifiably severe. On the conclusion of the hearing on Friday last His Lordship reserved judgment until Wednesday, when he found for the plaintiff, fixing the damages at \$40. He stated that had there not been some provocation on the part of the plaintiff—which, however, did not justify the defendant's conduct—the damages would have been higher. The Hon. W. S. Stewart, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and Messrs. A. McDonald, K. C., James D. Stewart, of Georgetown, for the defendant. The Court is still in session.

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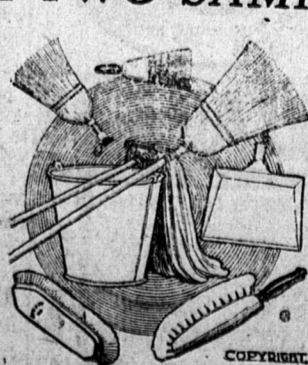
