Summer Resort At Georgetown

The Highlands Hotel Company, Ltd., are now busy enlarging and re-modelling the property purchased in Georgetown from the estate of the late Hon. D. A. MacKinnon to be used as a summer hotel. The contractors, Messrs. MacDougall and MacAulay of Charlottetown, have been at work for about two weeks and expect to have the job completed about the first of July in time for the tourist season.

In addition to the work on the hotel building they are also building separate structures, including a dance hall which will be 46 x 32. It will be of rustic design with an 8 foot post and a 30 foot gable. At the base of the large chimney to be constructed of cobble stones will be a large open fireplace. The building will be of wood with red asphalt shingles. The dancing space is 20 x 28. There will be a sitting room 20 x 20 and dressing rooms, with an open piazza 12 x 50 extending on the front of the building and commanding a beautiful view of the harbor and inflowing rivers.

Two bungalows are being built at the present time. One will contain eight rooms and one common lavatory and will be used especially for parties staying over night.

The other bungalow containing four bedrooms each with a private bath will be for the accommodation of patrons intending to remain for some time. This bungalow is 22 x 46 with a piazza 5 feet 6 inches in depth running along the entire front.

It is proposed, if business warrants, to build other bungalows of the same design all round the oval in front of the main building. This oval is surrounded by trees and it is proposed to remove such of these as would interfere with the view to the south. The bungalows will be of rustic design similar to those in connection with the C. N. R. Lodge in Pictou and other parts of Canada.

The main building is being enlarged by building an addition to the kitchen and providing additional bedrooms. Mr. George D. MacKinnon of Sherbrooke, P. Q., through whose enterprise this project was made possible, is at present at Georgetown in connection with the work.
