### High Distinction

#### For General Crerar

OTTAWA, July 23 — His Majesty the King has approved of the appointment of General M. D. G. Crerar, C.M., C.B., D.S.O., as his first Aide de Camp General from Canada, according to an announcement today by the Hon. Brooke Claxton, Minister of National Defence.

Gen. Crerar, former General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, First Canadian Army in Northwest Europe, 1944-45, is the first Canadian general officer to hold the special appointment of Aide de Camp General. It is a high individual honour but at the same time may be construed as recognition of Canada's outstanding war effort and the position of this country in the British Commonwealth of Nations.

Gen. Crerar retired from the Canadian Army in October, 1946. He now resides at Rockcliffe, Ont., a suburb of Ottawa.

Mr. Claxton also announced today that the retirement of Col. H. M. Urquhart, D.S.O., M.C., of Victoria, as additional Aide de Camp to His Majesty had also been approved on his reaching the retirement age of 67.

Col. Urquhart, who was colonel of Vancouver Island's The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's) has been an additional Aide de Camp to His Majesty the King for the Dominion of Canada since October, 1921.
