Livestock on Canadian Farms

As compared with 1936, the number of cattle in Canada in 1937 is practically the same. Sheep increased in 1937 by 12,800 head, and geese by 20,000. The number of horses is less by 8,550 hogs by 18,700. Hens and chickens, turkeys, and ducks also show decrease of 1,786,400, 46,800, and 16,100 respectively.

stock in Canada in 1937 are estimated as follows, with corresponding numbers for 1936 within brackets: Horses, 2,332,990 (2,891,540); cattle, 8,840,500 (8,840,600); sheep, 3,339,900 (3,327,100); hogs, 3,963,300 (4,145,000); hens and chickens, 53,892,900 (55,789,300); turkeys, 1,997,900 (2,044,700); ducks, 654,400 (670,500); geese, 874,900 (854,900).

Alberta. The numbers of sheep have increased in all the provinces except New Brunswick and Ontario. Hogs have declined in the Prairie Provinces, the other provinces showing increases. For all kinds of poultry decreases are registered in all the provinces except British Columbia.

Women Create Own Barriers

BOSTON, Dec. 22—Women are

about their own worst enemies in the business world, says Mrs. J. W. Shouse, author of "Careers for Women". The feminist authority denies the oft-repeated claim that women are crowded out in a man-wade world. "Women do not have my sympathy," Mrs. Shouse told the Women's City Club of Boston. "I don't picture women fighting against a closed, impassable door; I picture them as attaining what they set out to gain. I criticize, not the men for keeping them out, but the women themselves for whatever barriers exist."

Mrs. Shouse, who is chairman of the board of the Institute of Women's Professional Relations, declared such barriers as remain are mere labels or prejudices that women still cling to. She spoke at a dinner in her honor.

Many women, Mrs. Shouse pointed out, are working shoulder to shoulder with men in hundreds of lines of work. They have attained success because they decided what they wanted to do and

went ahead and did it. Clinging the old doctrine that the way to achieve success is to help oneself, she said: "There are very few jobs, whether public or private, that are handed to one on a silver platter. "I don't believe we don't get what we deserve. The trouble is we women haven't crowded in as much as we could. Our power is really limitless. All we need to do is to take proper advantage of it."
