Arrangements are being made to broadcast both games and it is thought that a hook-up will be made from Charlottetown.

Edmonton Rustlers won the Canadian Ladies Senior Hockey Championship, carrying with it the Lady Bessborough Trophy, at Edmonton on Monday night, defeating the Preston Rivulettes, the total score in the two game series being 4-2. This is the first time that the girls have played for a national title and plans are now being made to form a Dominion Women's hockey league with an annual play-off for the Bessborough Trophy. The Rivulettes were undefeated champions of Ontario for three years.

This week will be a mighty week in the hockey world with play-offs for world's championships professional hockey and also the championship series between Moncton Hawks and Ontario champions for the right to meet the Western Champions.

HAWKS LEFT YESTERDAY

Will Probably Play Niagara Falls In Next Step Towards The Allan Cup. (Canadian Press) MONCTON, N. B., March 26.—The Moncton Hawks hit the Allan Cup trail today which leads to Toronto or Ottawa where they will meet the winners of the Niagara Falls-Ottawa series in the Eastern Canada finals on Wednesday and Friday nights.

The team that won the Maritime championship and conquered the Montreal Royals, pride of the Province of Quebec, were given a rousing send-off as they boarded the train this afternoon. A crowd estimated at about 4,000 people were at the depot to wish them luck in the first Allan Cup quest that had ever been staged by a Moncton team.

Manager Ambrose Wheeler and Coach Percy Nicklin, chiefs of the Hawks board of strategy, took up even dozen players with them. They plan on spending Monday in Montreal and after getting their marching orders from the C. A. H. A. as to their next destination for the Eastern Canada skirmish, will continue to Toronto or Ottawa on Tuesday.

ted. The church had a capacity of over 2,000 and was well-filled. On-lookers said afterward hundreds would undoubtedly have been trampled but for the prompt action of those who took the situation in hand.

As it was three or four women threw themselves from the gallery in their terror. They were severely bruised, fainted and received minor injuries before she could be carried out.

A wave of indignation swept over Montreal as evidence of incendiaryism mounted. Firemen learned that on Saturday night an unnamed woman had visited the Presbytery and warned officials of the church it would be set afire. A strict watch was kept, but there was no sign of anything wrong until the fire broke out. On March 6 a small fire had been discovered on the ground floor beneath the gallery where today's blaze started. It is believed to have been set deliberately.

The host and sacred vessels were saved, but the historic interior, regarded as one of the finest in Canada, cannot be replaced. Insurance on the building was \$200,000.

During the day detectives were searching for the woman who uttered the warning yesterday. This is the fourth serious fire in Roman Catholic Churches in Montreal recently and police were following several lines of investigation in an effort to place the blame.

One theory was the firebug had remained in the church after an earlier Mass and had set the blaze in the wall at the back of the gallery. Criminality of the act was intensified, police pointed out, by the knowledge he must have had that the outbreak would occur when the church was filled with worshippers.

LEAFS BOW TO BRUINS IN OPENER

Goal by "Marty" Barry Breaks Up Overtime Battle In Boston Saturday Night Giving Bruins First Game Of Series. (By William King, Associated Press Staff Writer)

BOSTON, Mass., March 26.—(A.P.)—After 14 minutes and 14 seconds of "sudden death" play, Marty Barry broke a long deadlock and gave the Boston Bruins a 2-1 victory Saturday over the Toronto Maple Leafs before 15,000, in the opening game of the playoff series for the National Hockey League championship.

The world champion Leafs, who have not beaten the Bruins in the Boston Garden in three seasons, threatened to shake off their jinx as they matched the Bruins' speed and aggressiveness during every second of almost 75 minutes of dazzling play.

Leafs Get Opening Counter The three tallies scored were the rewards of sensational performances. Both sextettes performed brilliantly. The Leafs shocked the Boston defence with their amazing speed in the first period when, after almost 15 minutes of sparking action, Bill Thoms, playing in his first championship game, teamed with King Clancy and Harvey Jackson to start the scoring.

The successful combination assembled after a face-off on the Boston line. Joe Primeau beat Barry to the puck, batted it to Harvey Jackson and the latter fed it to Clancy, who darted into the backboards. He passed back to the trailing Thoms and a long, high shot found the Boston net.

Clapper And Barry Score for Boston The Bruins tied the score in the third minute of the second-period play, after facing off in centre. Barry slammed the rubber to Shore and took it back before entering enemy territory. He carried it up to the defense, slipped it between Clancy and "Happy" Day as "DIP" Clapper swept down the right boards, cut in and drove the puck through Lorne Chabot.

Clapper again teamed with Barry for the winning counter. The Boston right winger recovered a long drive that Charlie Conacher fired at the Boston net. He carried deep into the Toronto zone before passing to Barry, who drove a hard drive at Chabot and brushed past Alex Levinsky to slam the red-wood home, ending the "sudden death" action.

The Bruins, highly favored to win their home games of the three-out-of-five series, will oppose the Leafs here again next Tuesday.

MAROONS LOSE TO RED WINGS 2-0 MONTREAL, March 26.—(C.P.)—Spreading confusion in the ranks of their opponents with a carefully-planned closely-strung network of defensive hockey the flashy Detroit Red Wings moved forward in the National Hockey League playoffs here Saturday night with a 2-0 triumph over Montreal Maroons. It was the first playoff game Jack Adams' team had ever won and the Red Wings return to Detroit favorites to sweep the home-and-home total-goals-to-count series in Tuesday's game.

A capacity crowd of 12,500 sat glumly as Eddie Gerard's potent scoring lines were driven into submission by the relentless back-checking of the forwards and the steady, hard-hitting style of the defence. Red Wings broke into the lead half way through the first period. This goal gave them courage and by the time they added another in the opening minutes of the final period their ability to hold the lead was not questioned. Aurie scored the first goal on a pass from Voss, and Voss scored the second one unassisted.
