BELL GOVT.'S HUGE DEFICITS

- At Dec. 31, 1918, Mr. A. W. Hyndman, Manager of the Royal Bank, and External Auditor for the Government, reported the net debt of the province to be **\$1,006,991.71**
- At Dec. 8, 1919, Messrs. J. J. Hughes, M.P., and Mr. Hyndman, External Auditors showed the net debt to be **1,193,829.77**
- An increase of **\$ 186,838.06**
- At Sept. 8, 1919, Mr. John Anderson, Provincial Auditor, showed the excess of expenditure over receipts, less unearned subsidy, to be **\$ 253,938.78**
- An excess difference of **\$ 67,100.72**

WHICH IS CORRECT?

These are two alleged audits in the interests of the Bell Government to the same date, showing a difference of \$67,100.72—both cannot be correct. Which does the Bell Government accept—is it going to turn down Mr. Hughes and Mr. Hyndman? If so, why?

ANOTHER REPORT

Again, the Provincial Auditor, at the request of the Public Accounts Committee of the session of 1920, submitted an official statement of the position of the province at Dec. 31, 1919, which took the place of the External Audit, showing the Public Debt at that date to be **\$1,121,437.23**

An increase over 1919 (the first year reported on by the Bell Government) of **114,405.52**

An increase over 1911 (the last year of the previous Liberal Govt.,) of **113,174.30**

NOTE:—The Conservative Government erected 31 permanent bridges at a cost of \$116,366.80, besides purchasing two agricultural buildings in Charlottetown and Summerside respectively, and installing a complete new heating and lighting system in the Provincial Building.

A CAMPHOR DRIVEN SHIP

Is there a possibility that the ships of the future may be driven by the motive power supplied by camphor? Experiments show that this substance will drive objects through water. In a recent demonstration a piece of zinc was made into the shape of a boat and a small lump of camphor placed at the stern. Launched in a basin of water the little vessel sailed round and round in circles, pushed forward by the camphor at the stern. The explanation of the action is that the camphor gradually dissolving causes a disturbance of the water which forces the boat onward. In the experiment only a minute portion of the camphor dissolved so that presumably a piece as big as a pin's head would drive a toy boat many miles. Although this new use of camphor is only in its experimental stage, there is no telling how valuable it may become commercially. The expense of running a ship would be greatly reduced and danger of breakdown practically eliminated.

RUSSIA'S GREAT BELL.

The voice of a bell is really a chorus of noises whose tones are affected not only by the metallic composition of the bell but by its shape and proportion. Chinese bells are frequently square; Japanese and Korean barrel shaped, and Italian bells are gracefully "long-waisted." Vibrations from bells are very powerful. In the Alps mountains mule-teers nuzzle the small bells around the mule's neck lest their vibrations should start an avalanche. The largest bell ever cast was made in 1738 to the order of Empress Elizabeth of Russia and called the "Tsar Kolokol." To make this great bell a million dollars' worth of gold and jewellery was cast into the molting spot by Elizabeth's patriotic subjects. Four years later owing either to a fall or a flaw in the casting a large piece was broken from the side. It now stands mute on a circular base of stone in the Kremlin, Moscow. China can boast some very large bells. One in Pekin weighs 120,000 pounds and is 12 feet in diameter.

FIRPO DEFEATS JIM HIBBARD

NEW YORK, March 28.—Luis Angel Firpo, South American heavyweight and conqueror of Bill Brennan, won the decision over Jim Hibbard, of Buffalo, in a four-round exhibition bout for the benefit of the American committee for devastated France, tonight.

Firpo showed much speed and decided improvement in boxing.

Jack Britton, former welterweight champion, and Elino Flores, Filipino boxer, went through four rounds of milling to a draw.

Frankie Genaro, United States lightweight champion, won handily from Bobby Doyle, of New York, in their four-round exhibition, while Johnny Dundee junior lightweight champion, captured the decision from Tony Vaccarrelli of New York in four rounds.

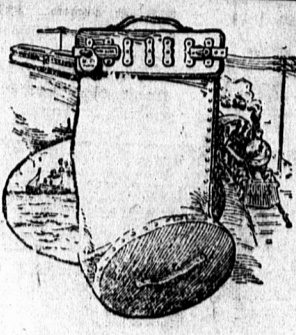
