HONG KONG, July 17 (Saturday) - (CP) - A huge Catalina plane, on the Macao-Hong Kong run, landed in the South China sea today with 27 persons aboard including two Canadians.

The landing was reported by Cathay Pacific Airways, operators of the plane. The airline said the Canadians were Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Stewart, (hometown unavailable) who had left their three children in Hong Kong.

The company said that it had no further information on casualties except that one passenger, Wong Yu of Hong Kong, was rescued in a lifejacket, his arm broken. Company officials expressed hope more passengers got off before the plane sank.

The plane carried 23 passengers and four crew members. Others listed aboard were Dale Cramer, the pilot; K. S. MacDuff, second pilot; R. L. Frost, traffic manager; and Mr. and Mrs. H.M. R. Hodgson. Cramer and Hodgson are Americans. Hodgson is a Texas company employee.

The International Fur Conference, which had been in session for four and a half days at the Charlottetown Hotel, was concluded Friday at noon. A lot of work had been left for the last morning session, but as many had made reservations to leave in the afternoon, business was speeded up pretty rapidly.

It was decided to continue the conferences, all agreed had been a huge success, and after quite a bit of discussion the eloquent invitations of O. Brager-Larsen and Johan Lindstrom prevailed and Norway was picked for the 1949 conference.

Three invitations had been received from Detroit, Mich., but most of the delegates thought it would be a nice gesture to recognize Norway's claim.

An interim committee will be appointed, with one member from the United States, Canada and Norway, to make arrangements for the next conference and each country will within 30 days state the name of its member.

### Alberta Election Called For Aug. 17

#### Value Of P.E.I. 1947 Fisheries Declined

OTTAWA, July 16 (CP) - Prince Edward Island's fisheries dropped 35 per cent in value last year from their peak year in 1946, the Bureau of Statistics reported today. The 1947 production was only worth \$2,397,000, compared with \$4,671,000 the previous year.

Smaller quantities of landed fish and lower prices were both responsible for the decline. Total quantities of fish and shellfish landed was 517,000 hundredweight, compared with 855,000 in 1946.

#### EIGHT-YEAR-OLD DROWNED

HALIFAX, July 16 (CP) - Eight-year-old Allan Burrell of nearby Spryfield was drowned here today after two playmates unsuccessfully attempted to rescue him. Ivan Brommitt, 14, also of Spryfield, succeeded in bringing the youth to shore. Efforts by Halifax firemen to revive the boy proved futile.

#### EDMONTON, July 16 (CP) - Alberta voters will mark ballots Aug. 17 to choose a new Provincial Government.

Premier Manning, who announced the election date today, will spearhead the Social Credit forces seeking a return to power. The C.C.F. and Liberals also plan entering enough candidates to form a government if elected. The Independents, under J. Percy Page of Edmonton, have announced they will nominate 22 or 23 candidates for the 57 seats at stake.

Nomination day will be Aug. 7. Premier Manning ended months of speculation over the election date with his official announcement. He urged re-election of the Social Creditors who went in to power in 1936 and were returned at the 1940 and 1944 general elections.

It was almost certain an election would be called for next month and even before the date was announced officially, almost 120 candidates had been nominated. Social Credit and C.C.F. parties each had about 45 candidates in the field, the Liberals 20 and others 10.

A feature of the election will be the vote in Edmonton where four party provincial leaders will be seeking victory. Premier Manning, Elmer E. Roper, C.C.F. chief, and J. Harper Prowse, Provincial Liberal leader, already have been nominated for re-election in Edmonton.

#### 33-Cent Australian Butter Not Available

OTTAWA, July 16 (CP) - J.A. Tonkin, assistant secretary to the Australian Agriculture Department, quoted butter at 23 cents a pound in an interview here today. Then he slammed the door: he said it was prevented from coming to Canada by exchange difficulties, Australia being in the sterling area.

### Fighting Is Continued Elsewhere

#### Nazareth Is Captured By Jewish Forces.

CAIRO, July 16 (AP) - Arabs and Jews agreed tonight to stop fighting in the Holy City of Jerusalem.

It was reported officially in Amman, capital of Trans-Jordan, that the Arab League political committee had agreed to a cease-fire in the city effective at midnight, Greenwich mean time, (9 P.M. A.D.T.) tonight.

The Israeli Government previously said it was prepared to accept a United Nations truce on all Palestine fronts and a cease-fire in Jerusalem provided the Arabs did likewise. There was no word from the Arab League committee regarding a cessation of fighting in areas outside the Holy City. The Committee is in session in Lebanon.

Jewish troops captured Nazareth today, the boyhood home of Christ, and northern stronghold of Fawzi Pasha Al Kaukji's Arab irregulars, an Israeli announcement said. It was taken following a steady Jewish advance on the city.

An Arab Legion communiqué said a Jewish attack on Bab El Wad, on the Jews left 87 dead on the battlefield. The communiqué added that Legion forces had captured the villages of Beer-Maain, Elberg and Kulla, north of Beit Nabala in the Lydda area.

Jewish warplanes bombed Egypt again during the day, attacking the Tel El Arish airport near the Palestine border. The Israeli Government, which announced the attack, said new Egyptian air attacks had been made on the Tel Aviv area. Both sides appeared to be stepping up their air warfare.

The Jews bombed Cairo for the first time Thursday night. The Israeli Government said it was ready to accept a Security Council truce on all Palestine fronts and a cease-fire in Jerusalem, provided the Arabs did likewise. There was no word from the Arabs.

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP) - The United States today announced powerful reinforcement of its aerial striking arm in Europe. Sixty B-29 Superfortresses were dispatched to Britain for "training."

The disclosure was immediately interpreted by officials here as a new move in the Berlin showdown with Russia.

The announcement came, moreover, as it was learned that British, American and French Governments are considering the eventual use of forceful measures against Russia - including economic restrictions - if necessary to try to break the Russian blockade of Berlin.

Officials said that Congress, called into session July 26 on domestic issues, might well find itself faced with critical foreign policy problems in a few weeks if the Berlin situation continues to go from bad to worse.

The announcement from the United States Air Force said that the five dozen huge Superfortresses would spend a "short"

training period at the R.A.F. bases in the British Isles.

In London, the United States

BERLIN, July 16 (CP) - The Russians announced today their fighter planes would train in the air corridor used by the Western Powers to fly supplies to Berlin.

The Russians warned Americans and British authorities their fighters would go aloft from airfields at Koethen, Dalgow and Brandenburg, west and southwest of Berlin. United States operations men said the Russians told them the fighters will be flying between 7 A.M. and 7 P.M.

There seemed to be no doubt among American military men that the Russian announcement was another "harassing tactic." They stressed that the Russian announcement was not affecting the air shuttle into the blockaded city.

Embassy announced the planes would be in Britain two to four weeks and then go to bases on the

### Ch'town Berry Growers Discuss Air Shipments

A decision to make a trial shipment of strawberries by plane to the Boston market was reached last evening by strawberry growers from the Charlottetown area. The shipment is scheduled to leave the airport about midnight next Monday evening and will be sold on the Boston market about eight hours later on Tuesday morning.

The strawberry growers held their emergency meeting at the Experimental Farm in order to find a profitable outlet for this year's bumper crop.

Mr. Ralph Balderson of Winsloe was elected as chairman for the evening and in his opening remarks pointed out the need to find an outside market for berries in order to obtain a profitable price and to avoid waste in the fields. He mentioned that strawberries from Cape Cod, Lexington and Nova Scotia are past their peak by the time the Island berries are ready for the Boston market.

Mr. Harry Burnham, representing the Mason Alger Company of Boston, was introduced to the meeting by the chairman. Mr. Burnham has been supervising the shipment of strawberries through the Montreal Strawberry Exchange.

During his remarks he explained that trays are superior to crates in shipping berries and that they usually sell for a five cent premium. The total cost of transportation

### U. S. Steel And Ford Grant Wage Boosts

United States Steel and Ford Motor Company yesterday (Friday) announced pay increases for almost 800,000 of their employees.

Their action gave new momentum to organized labor's campaign for a third round of post-war wage boosts. Price increases are beginning to result.

Early this year much of United States industry seemed determined firmly to resist any third-round moves. But industry's front was breached May 26 when General Motors faced with a strike threat, granted a raise of 11 cents an hour. And the front wall fell apart early this month when John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers (U.M.W.) won a 9 1/2-a-day increase and other benefits.

Almost daily pay increases are being granted by the big employers. Strikes are becoming more frequent as unions, principally those affiliated with the C.I.O. press their advantage.
