ON THE SIDELINES

One of the most popular and conscientious hockey players ever to wear the Abernethy colors leaves this morning to join the Baltimore Orioles in the Eastern United States Amateur League where he will hook up with three former teammates who took their departure Saturday last. We speak of Johnny "Snag" Squarbriggs, young in years but nevertheless one of the veterans of Abernethy teams and a player whose ability was never really recognized until last season's memorable series with the Wolverines when he was injected into the lineup when players were disqualified. Never a prolific scorer "Snag" was nevertheless rated high in Maritime circles, his aggressiveness and never-says-die spirit often pepping up the morale of the team when their spirits would be at a low ebb. He should prove a valuable addition to the Baltimore team to whom he is no stranger. During the season of 1932-33 Johnny was a valued member of the Bronx team in this same league and often his prowess on the steel blades was recognized by American sport scribes. Incidentally Snag will again be playing under the same coach, Bill Price, the present mentor of the Orioles being employed in this capacity with the Bronx squad when Snag first sported the colors of an American club.

Desilets Gets Counter As Team Wins

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) First period goals by Joffre Desilets and Bill Kendall gave London a 2-0 victory over Buffalo at London last night while Rochester defeated Windsor 3-1 at Rochester and Cleveland eked out a 1-0 win at Pittsburgh in the three-game International Hockey League card. Vic Ripley scored the winning goal for Cleveland with 22 seconds left to play after taking a pass from Lloyd Gross. Joe Sharke, the Pittsburgh net, had stopped 49 shots prior to the one that eluded him.

Desilets' goal for London came on a play with Ray Geillie as the former Saint John Beaver line travelled at top speed. Another Maritime Big Four product, Owen Lennon, was in on Kendall's goal. He combined with Eric Pettinger to give Kendall his scoring chance.

Hal Pickett, Nick Wasnie and Whitley Farrant were the goal-getters for Rochester in their win over Windsor while Clarence Drouillard counted Windsor's only goal one minute from the end of the game. Don Smille and Dave Downie made the play for Drouillard's marker.

Canada Wins "Test" Series

(C. P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Dec. 3.—Canada won the third "test" hockey match of the five-game series with England tonight at Richmond 9-3. The team representing the Dominion has made a clean sweep of the series so far, winning both previous games 5-4.

Will Turn To Junior Brand This Year

Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Simmonds of Charlottetown, passed through the city this morning, en route home from Montreal and Toronto. Mr. Simmonds, who is connected with the Charlottetown Abernethy, is keenly interested in the hockey situation in the Maritimes. He said that the Abbies had a well-balanced, powerful team ready for competition this year, but that the professional clubs had riddled their ranks until there was very little good material left. Several of the Island stars are planning to leave for Denver and Baltimore to sign professional contracts.

Mr. Simmonds said that Charlottetown and the Island in general would likely turn to junior and midget hockey this year. He was of the opinion that it would pay Maritime cities to concentrate on developing good junior outfits this year, as the playoffs were scheduled for this part of the country. The Charlottetown sportsman declared that the fans on the Island would support junior and even midget teams, and that already plans to operate loops among the younger players had been formulated. He remarked that last year midget and juvenile teams had packed the rink for some of their games. The Island, Mr. Simmonds said, was prepared to revert from "big time" hockey to the local brand, and would give it whole-hearted support.—Moncton Transcript.

Moncton Wins Disputed Game 10 - 9

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, Dec. 3.—Two fights, disputed rulings of the referee and one casually marred what otherwise was a fast and furious exhibition hockey game here tonight between Saint John and Moncton. The game finally ended in an overtime period when Jerry McCabe, Beavers' defenceman refused to leave the ice when penalized by Referee Cy Taylor, for his part in a fight started between Len LeBlanc, Moncton, and Bill Walker, Saint John. When the rink management threatened to have him forcibly removed the entire Saint John team left the ice. The score was 9-8 in favor of Saint John when the fight started and after the Beavers left the ice, the puck was faced off twice, Captain Kenny Carroll of Moncton scored two goals in an empty net and Moncton was awarded the decision 10-9.

During the hectic going in the third period Vince Livingstone, who turned in a great game for the Beavers accidentally bumped Yvon Gould in a race for a loose puck in Moncton territory, and the Moncton centre star fell and slid into the boards, injuring his head and neck. He was carried off the ice and was unable to return to the game. It was said after the game his injuries were not serious.

The game was the fourth of the best out of five "friendly" exhibition games and the series now stands two games all. A spokesman for Moncton stated tonight that there would be no fifth game so far as Moncton is concerned in view of tonight's fiasco.

C.A.H.A. Upheld In Olympic Selection

(G. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Dec. 3.—Secretary Alphonse Therien of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association today released a series of telegrams from hockey leaders all over the country, the general tenor of which indicated the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association was endorsed in its choice of Port Arthur Bearcats as Canada's Olympic representatives.

The C. A. H. A. had wired all branches of the C.A.H.A. urging a playoff between Montreal Royals, Eastern Canada finalists, and Bearcats, Western Canada champions, for the right to go to Germany in place of Halifax Wolverines, now disbanded.

President Gilroy of the C. A. H. A. wired he was "compelled to refuse reopening of the question," as the committee which made the decision was unanimous. The decision, he said, was approved by Vice-President Hardy, British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan branches. Only one to dissent later were past president F. C. Greenleaf of Montreal and the Quebec branch. Ottawa had not been heard from.

From Amherst, N.S., J. E. Wry replied he was "very sympathetic with Quebec branch but cannot see your argument as outlined in wire." He had every confidence that the C. A. H. A. executive would not jeopardize Canada's Olympic chances.

Maroons Come From Behind In Third Period To Beat Canadiens; Bruins Lose

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Dec. 3.—Montreal Maroons evened their seasons series with Canadiens tonight when they won a thrill-packed National Hockey League game 3-2 but had to battle all the way to keep Sylvio Mantha's red shirts out in the third period.

The Stanley Cup holders had to come from behind in the third period to win after each had scored in the first and second periods. Penalties played a part in the scoring as Maroons got one of their goals when Leroy Goldsworthy was in the penalty box when Maroons scored in the second period.

Canadiens' third period goal was scored while Dave Trotter was serving a penalty.

Canadiens went into the lead in the first period when George Mantha caught the defence napping on a high loob from centre ice that hit the screen behind the net.

Before the defence could clear, Armand Mondou and Goldsworthy sped in. Mondou got the rubber and Goldsworthy was in front of the goal to score easily from Mondou's pass.

Maroons tied it up in the second period while Goldsworthy was off. Big Lionel Conacher, who was attacking more than usual, was on the scoring end of a play with Hooley Smith and Baldy Northcott in a gang attack.

Northcott passed out from the corner and Smith relayed to Conacher at the right of the nets. His short flip gave Cude no chance.

A penalty to Dave Trotter paved the way for Canadiens to take the lead in the third period when Paul Haynes shot home a goal in a gang attack after Aurel Jollat and Johnny Gagnon had passed the puck around inside Maroons' blue line to make the opening for him.

A little more than two minutes later Baldy Northcott tied it up when he poked in a rebound from a hard drive by Hooley Smith and Earl Robinson shot home the game winning goal late in the period when he stole the puck at centre ice and sped in unmolested to score from close in. He had just jumped on the ice for Stew Evans as he finished serving a penalty.

The game ended with Canadiens desperately trying for another goal as Evans took his second penalty. Billy Beveridge and great checking by the Maroons thwarted them. Gaston Leroux, up from Springfield to replace the injured Art Lesieur, turned in a fine effort on Canadiens defence and made some nice rushes.

Bruins Lose Early Lead

BOSTON, Dec. 3.—(A. P.)—Chicago Blackhawks lengthened their American Division lead in the National Hockey League by coming from behind tonight to out-skate Boston Bruins for a 3-1 victory before 12,000 fans.

Before the crowd were Lester Patrick and his New York Rangers, who are trailing Clem Loughlin's speedsters by three points. The Rangers were driven out of New York by the six-day bike race and have been practicing here.

The Bruins, who broke a three-game losing streak against the Rangers Sunday, got off to a flying start and registered their only tally during the fourth minute of play, Max Kaminsky passing to Charlie Sands, who fired a high angle shot over goalie Mike Karakas' left shoulder.

This enemy success spurred the Hawks and they needed only 20 seconds to register the tying goal. "Doc" Romnes converted Paul Thompson's assist for the score. The same combination accounted for the second Chicago tally in the second period.

With a minute left in the middle frame two Bruins were sent off with Don MacFadyen, who received a major penalty for slashing Babe Siebert across the face, and while the teams played short-handed, Eddie Morens passed to Mush March and the right-wing golfer a long shot into the Boston net for the third goal.
