CONGRATULATIONS TO MR. NASH.

The Patriot announces that Mr. Fred J. Nash, the well-known city editor of that journal, has been appointed editor in succession to Hon. David Laird, resigned. This promotion has been confidently expected by Mr. Nash's many friends since the time of Mr. Laird's withdrawal, and their expectations are now realised. The Patriot has been under strong editorial guidance for a long term of years and has, apart from its political side, been a well written and clean exponent of public opinion and an able advocate of many worthy causes and objects. Such, we are satisfied, it will be under the management of Mr. Nash. He has served a full apprenticeship in newspaper work and has earned his promotion by faithful and judicious service as city editor. His experience, coupled with good abilities, give every assurance that he will make the best use of his new opportunities and responsibilities. The GUARDIAN sincerely and heartily congratulates Mr. Nash upon his deserved promotion.

NOT INSIGNIFICANT.

The Ottawa Free Press, which exercises the function of home organ of the Laurier administration, speaks of "the insignificant ballot, and virtual absence of any real expression of public opinion" in the plebiscite! Such flippancy of language can count for little in any sober expression of public opinion, and we only draw attention to what the Free Press has said because it is in line with a policy adopted by a majority of the Liberal journals of Canada in attempting to belittle the verdict of 29th of September. "Insignificant," indeed! When more than half a million men of Canada, an army of voters such as never before were marshalled to decide a great moral issue, marched to the polls and won the battle of prohibition! These men represented a large percentage of the entire electorate of Canada. They voted in every constituency of the Dominion from the Atlantic to the Pacific. They represent households containing two million five hundred thousand souls. They include tens of thousands to whom the principle of prohibition is dear as their political rights. And let it not be forgotten that they were summoned to the polls by the government for which the Free Press affects to speak. It therefore ill becomes an organ of the government to speak of them as an "insignificant" body, or of the expression of their views at the polls as no expression of public opinion. Such contemptuous words are calculated to antagonise the temperance electorate and drive them to show at another election that their votes can be made effective to punish such blatant utterance of misguided party organs. There is an amazing wisdom in the section of the liberal press that thus, day after day, flings contempt on the prohibitionists of Canada. Their course is far removed from what might have been expected, as it is contrary to good judgement and sound common sense. If they will but continue to belittle the plebiscite victory and insult the majority of temperance voters as they have been doing for weeks past they will realise in time to come that they have alien-

ated, not the entire body of temperance voters, but no insignificant portion of their number.

If the Liberal leaders have any control over their newspaper organs and are themselves guided by a prudent foresight they will speedily put a stop to all these diatribes concerning the 'insignificance' of the plebiscite. We are glad to find that in his answer to the prohibition delegation Sir Wilfrid Laurier treated them and the plebiscite with profound respect. He is at least more politic than his home organ.

Many different reasons are assigned for the extensive war preparations that have been made and are still continued by the British government. At first it was on account of the Fashoda affair with France; then we were told it was in order to checkmate Russia in the east, or to be ready to fight both Russia and France; next it was in view of Germany re-opening the South African question and finally the cable writers would lead us to suppose that the preparations are intended to assist the United States in the Philippines, and that Britain will be rewarded with a share in the group, or at least a coaling station there. A full survey of all the contradictory assumptions leads us to the conclusion that Lord Salisbury is keeping his real object a profound secret, and that no one outside his cabinet knows precisely why he is so energetically preparing.

THE GUARDIAN unhesitatingly expresses the opinion that a man many times convicted of violating the Scott Act, or any other law of the land is an unfit person to be appointed to any office in the gift of any government. In this connection we ask the esteemed Examiner why it publishes, in violation of law and good morals, the advertisement of a notorious lottery concern? We pause for a reply.
