## Canadiens Hit Stride Under Hart

(CP By Guardian's Special Wire)  
MONTREAL, Jan. 17.—Happy days are here again for Montreal Canadiens, friends once again with the man who pays the freight—the cash customer.

Now meet the person responsible for this—Cecil Hart.

At the start of the season when Canadiens were about to take the ice for their first practice they were given a pep-talk by Hart, installed as manager again of the club he led when "Flying Frenchmen" was a hockey word.

"We're going out this year," Hart told the players, "to get back all those customers we've lost during the last few seasons."

There wasn't any fuss about it at first, but those quiet spoken words did inspire complete confidence in his team. Last night Hart saw his prophecy fulfilled when Canadiens played a home game against their intra-city rivals, Maroons.

A crowd officially estimated at 12,300 largest in Montreal for five years, jammed every inch of the forum to see Hart's happy Habitués trounce Maroons 5-0 and thereby take a six-point lead in the Canadian section.

## Owens' Again Named Premier U. S. Athlete

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Once again emphasizing Jesse Owens' position as last year's premier United States track and field athlete, Daniel J. Ferris, secretary treasurer of the Amateur Athletic Union today named Ohio State's Olympic sprint and broad jump champion to four positions on each of his All-America and All-College teams for 1936.

Holder of five world records and co-holder of another, Owens was listed as the outstanding United States performer in the 100 and 200-meter dash, 200-meter hurdles and the broad jump. The fleet Negro, now a professional, holds the international marks at 100 yards, 200 meters, 200 yards, 200-meter and 220-yard hurdles and the broad jump.

In addition he has bettered the 100-meter record several times with the aid of a tail wind.

## English Cricket Team To Tour The Dominion

TORONTO, Jan. 17.—(CP)—Marking an important step in the development of cricket in the Dominion a team of English players will visit Canada next summer. Any announcement was made here today that the Marylebone Cricket Club, governing body of the sport in England, had decided to send a strong eleven late in July. Cricket authorities here hope the tour will be of sufficient duration to permit a coast-to-coast itinerary.

Announcement of the M.C.C.'s decision was made by Hon. R. C. Matthews, chairman of the Canadian cricket advisory board.

## Canada Retains Lapham Cup

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.—(CP)—Canada held the Lapham Cup emblematic of international squash supremacy, today after a great drive from the brink of seemingly defeat that was capped by a win for Horace Lewis of Toronto against J. Fred Rogers of Buffalo.

The United States team ran up a 6-3 lead in the matches Saturday only to see their Canadian opponents pull ahead 7-6. An American victory in the 14th match, deciding the competition at 7-7, set the stage for what proved the deciding contest between Lewis and Rogers which the Canadians won 11-15, 15-12, 12-15, 15-6, 15-9.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—Boston Bruins slipped another win over the fading New York Americans to night, 3-0, and climbed up to within a point of sectional second place in the National Hockey League standings.

Bruins scored a goal in each period. Hooley Smith, veteran Bruin centre, took a pass from wingman Leroy Goldsworthy, shortly after the half-way mark of the opening frame to split the American defence and score.

Cooney Weiland broke away from a New York power play near the middle of the second chapter and scored a clean-cut marker to put the Bruins two up. Smith was in the penalty box at the time serving a two minute sentence because Boston had seven men in action for a moment.

Goldsworthy rang up the third Boston tally at the half-way mark of the last period when he converted Cook's deft relay.

The fans numbered about 11,000.

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—Detroit Red Wings whipped the floundering Chicago Black Hawks 2-0 tonight and pulled out three full games ahead of the bunch in the National Hockey League's United States section.

Brilliant little Larry Aurie and sharpshooting Marty Barry continued their close fight for scoring honors, each scoring a goal before 13,000 spectators.

It was the 14th defeat of the sea-faring Hawks, who gave a scrappy performance but were whipped largely through a bit of the ill-fortune which has dogged them all year. After Chicago had outgotten the league-leading Wings through the first period and most of the second, Aurie scored the first goal, grabbing a puck which hopped off the sticks of both Paul Thompson and Earl Seibert to race in and beat goalie Mike Karakas unassisted. Barry was serving a penalty at the time.

Late in the final period Barry took a pass from Johnny Sorrell and drove the puck through Karakas' legs, and from that point on the Wings fought off a final, desperate Chicago drive.

## Grant Again Upsets Budge To Win Title

TAMPA, Fla., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Bryan M. "Bitsy" Grant, the Atlanta giant killer, won his second successive tennis title from Donald Budge, United States number one ranking amateur, by defeating the Oakland, Calif., redhead, 4-6, 6-3, 2-6, 6-2, in the finals of the Dixie tennis tournament today.

Grant, United States third ranked player, defeated the Californian in the finals of the Miami Biltmore tournament at Coral Gables last Sunday.

Grant failed to get many of Budge's smashing shots in the opening set, but in the second he made retrieves which seemed almost impossible.

Budge led 2-0 in the third set before Grant won three games in a row. Budge took the sixth game. Grant won the next two, losing only one point in each. They duelled the ninth game six times before Grant took the game and set at 6-3.

Grant played the best tennis of the tournament in the final set. He won the first three games as Budge tried in vain to outguess and outpace him.

The Californian deuced the next game twice before finally breaking through Grant's service to win. He took the fifth game too but Grant ran through the next three games to take the set at 6-2.

## Red Wings Take Lead In Midget Hockey League

Midget Red Wings were too fast and too experienced for the Beavers Saturday afternoon in a regular league encounter and as a result Beavers were forced to accept their second straight defeat this time by a 5-0 score. But although blanked the youthful Beavers put up a stirring battle all the way. They held the fast-skating Wings to a 2-0 score in the first two sessions, while missing several scoring chances themselves but they tired somewhat in the final canto allowing their opponents to shoot three more counters before the final goal.

Red Wings victory gave them first place in the standing breaking the tie that had existed between them and the Canadiens. Wings have yet to suffer a defeat this season.

## Island Curling Assn. Affiliated With Dominion

TORONTO, Jan. 17.—The executive committee of the Dominion Curling Association at a week-end meeting approved applications for affiliation from the British Columbia Association, the Vancouver branch and the Prince Edward Island Association. Twelve different associations which constitute four-fifths of the registered curlers in Canada are now enrolled with the Dominion body.

E. P. Atkinson, honorary secretary of the Association it was learned, has been flooded with inquiries regarding the visit of the Scottish curlers during the 1937-38 season. The Scottish curlers recently accepted the Dominion body's invitation to visit Canada.

The annual meeting of the Dominion Curling Association will be held in Toronto early in March.

## Canadiens Blank Maroons 5-0 Before Record Crowd; Leafs Win In Overtime

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.—Montreal Canadiens sported a six-point lead today in the Canadian section of the National Hockey League after walloping their intra-city rivals Maroons, 5-0 Saturday night before a crowd of 12,300—largest Montreal hockey attendance during the last five years.

Despite the fact they were minus Babe Siebert, the Flying Frenchmen gave a dazzling display as they skated tirelessly and passed perfectly to hand Maroons a crushing defeat.

Maroons took four penalties during the battle and while three of these banishments were being served, Canadiens hopped to the attack for four goals. They scored twice in the first period and then added three more counters in the second.

## Fred Perry High Pro In Tennis Show

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—Frederick John Perry, the paddle-footed, pipe-smoking British player is worth the money to pro tennis. Whether he is worth a top price of \$9,900 against Ellsworth Vines in the alternating hush and hand-clapping of Madison Square Garden is something else again.

But the recently-turned pro, immaculately turned-out tennis titan is a natural showman—the answer to the pro tennis troupe's prayer for color.

Even the experts who led off on their wrong-guessing for 1937 by picking Vines over Perry in the Briton's pro debut agreed that a sorely-needed personality had come to the ranks of the tennis mercenaries.

Not forgetting that Bill Tilden with his enormous ego and consistent carry-up, the greatest box-office draw once upon a time, they hailed the advent of Perry as the lift that would keep the pros from handing the game back to the amateurs for a time, at least.

From the moment he stood at a attention under a spotlight the band playing "God Save the King" (and the ring-worms who infest the place ordinarily wondered why they were playing "My Country 'Tis of Thee") until Vines eventually folded, Perry was a showman.

Whenever he passed a linesman, Perry ruffled that gent's hair. He mimed all over the court on oversized feet that do a duck-waddle with never an extra step.

The befuddled critics, who found some solace in the fact that Vines was a bit sicker with influenza than Perry was, were pulling for the Englishman before it was over. You cannot hate a man who is totally unperturbed by the biggest crowd that ever saw a tennis match—at a \$2.00 top.

At set point, a galleryite let out a loud, uncomplimentary sound as Perry tossed up the ball to serve. Perry echoed the sound as he let the ball fall to the court without serving. Nothing ruffles him.

In fact, he is at his best when the fury is at its height—and in the past he has been at his worst when the going was easiest. Bill Tilden once sized him up as "the best-worst or worst-best tennis player I ever saw."

After their first pro match Vines confided that Perry's earnings prior to his professional venture which stands to net him something between \$75,000 and \$100,000 in his "honeymoon year" was \$10,000 for some movie work in England. This pay-off was not exactly cricket when Perry was ranked as an amateur, but it lightened the burden of those who sent him around the world as a tennis player.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Glenn Cunningham, starting in the first handicap race of his colorful career, was defeated by a comparatively unknown New York University freshman and dropped a time decision to Lou Burns, Manhattan's great miler, in the annual track and field meet at the 165th infantry armory Saturday night.

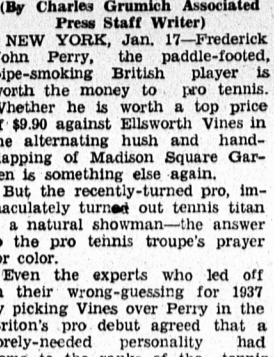
Starting from scratch in one of the three 1,000-yard handicap races Cunningham failed by inches to catch diminutive David Urbach to whom he gave 55 yards.

Burns, intercollegiate outdoor half mile and mile titlist and also starting from scratch, won his heat in the good time of 2:17.7, less than six seconds back of Cunningham's world record of 2:10.1. Urbach was clocked in 2:16.4 with the burly Kansas only a fraction of a second slower.

The third of the three heats went to Cunningham's perennial rival, Gene Venzke of the New York A.C. Venzke won easily but his time of 2:17.2 was the slowest of the three events. Venzke also started from scratch.

## Vines Wins Second Victory From Perry In Straight Sets

DETROIT, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Ellsworth Vines, showing no trace of his recent illness, whipped Fred Perry in straight sets, 14-12, 6-2, 6-1, before 6,500 spectators here Saturday to draw within one match of evening the count in their professional tennis tournament.

The extended first set decided the match. Perry never was able to make his shots count after the tall Californian took the lead in the 25th game and then broke through the former amateur champion's service for the set.

Vines, who lost three successive matches to Perry before his first victory at Pittsburgh last night, was in full control of his ground strokes and frequently manoeuvred the Briton out of position for fast placements.

Perry scored the first break in service in the long first set, with a beautiful cross-court return of Vines' service, an overdrive of the baseline by the American. The professional titheholder, however, came back to even matters, breaking through Perry with scorching drives that forced the Briton on errors.

Perry again broke through Vines' in the 19th game, a service ace counting the American's only point, but Vines, with two successive placements and a kill at the net, gained the set.

Vines was at set-point with 40-15 in the 24th game, only to see his opponent score a placement and force him into errors to pull out the game. He wasted no time winning his own service and then, with the score 30-all in the 26th game, came the break that ended the exhibition set. One of Perry's drives hit the net cord and jumped out of the court. At set-point again, Vines drove a hard placement to win.

The American pro quickly ran out the match as Perry, apparently tiring, won but 19 points in the second set and 13 in the third.

In a one-set exhibition George Lott defeated Bruce Barnes.
