The second mass was held in the Holy Name Hall at 10 o'clock, the celebrant being Rev. W. V. D. Dolan of Seven Mile Bay. Two papers were given by Rev. Liturgy and Parish Life by Rev. J. Martin Hellebrand, Pastor of Holy Cross Church, St. Louis, Miss.

Discussion leader on this paper was Rev. Fr. McKinnon of Pictou, C.B.

The second paper, Liturgy and Parish Life was read by Rev. Dr. Dolan of Seven Mile Bay. The discussion leader being Rev. Charles J. Carroll of Milltown, N.B.

The closing of the day was held at 3 p.m. in the Holy Name Hall. The celebrant being Rev. J. N. Poirier of St. John's, N.S.

Two more papers were read, the first, Liturgy and Parish Life by Rev. J. D. McNeill of North Rustico, with Rev. Fr. Carroll of Lot 7 discussion leader.

Reorganization For Vocational Training Mooted

Need of provision for vocational courses in the higher school grades was strongly emphasized in a report made by the local Advisory Committee of Employment and Selection Service. The Chairman, Mr. George A. Moran, presided. It was decided to recommend the reorganization for consideration by the Regional Advisory Committee which resumes its monthly session here today.

Non-members of the committee, including the Mayor, Mr. W. K. Keenan, rector of St. Dunstan's University, Dr. G.D. Steele, principal of the Val-de-Cote College, Prof. J.H. Blanchard, vice principal, and Mr. C.F. Hine, of Prince Street School, were present by invitation.

The report of the committee, which was presented by Mr. Moran, stated that the present school system prepares pupils for professional and (or) highly technical occupations gained only after a university or college degree.

"Whereas only a very small percentage of the enrollment in the common schools is equipped occupationally to meet the needs of the community, and whereas the present school system prepares pupils for professional and (or) highly technical occupations gained only after a university or college degree, and whereas the present school system does not provide for the training of those who are unskilled or semi-skilled laborers, therefore

"Be it resolved that the school system be re-organized to provide technical training in all the major trades and progressive advancement in the teaching of those trades through the four higher common school grades and high school, so that the majority of the pupils remain in school and the further they advance the more they will know about the particular trade they are studying, and that the training be so arranged that the student be able to take the technical part of his education as he wishes."

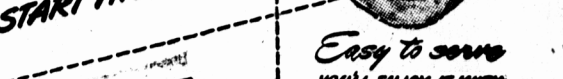
