CONCENTRATES FOR FEEDING PURPOSES.—Mr. H. H. Dean, Principal of dairying in the O. A. College, writing in the Farmers' Advocate of September 20th compares the values of the different concentrates for feeding purposes. He points out that on a protein basis "Cotton Seed Meal" is four times more valuable as oats and three times more valuable than bran. While oil cake is worth three times the value of oats. This, however, does not work out to this extent in practical experience. The cow is not able to get all the value from the Cotton Seed and besides it is not safe to feed more than 1 1/2 lbs. a day. However, the manure obtained from the feeding of Cotton Seed Meal is four times as valuable as that from the feeding of oats and our farmers might make use of this information in feeding this winter. Oats is worth at the present time \$30 a ton. Cotton Seed can be purchased for \$34 a ton or on a feeding value, one lb. of protein in oats costs more than three times as much as one lb. of protein in cotton seed meal at the present prices.

GOOD LECTURE.—Rev. Mr. Curtis, Field Secretary of the S. S. of the Methodist Church delivered an interesting and instructive address in the Methodist Church, Mount Stewart, on Tuesday evening, Nov. 24th. He spoke of the conversion of the young life in the teen age as the problem of the Christian Church today. Unless the Church today makes a tremendous effort to enlist the service of the youth, the future of the church will be in great danger. The speaker went on in intense earnestness, to impress his hearers with the supreme necessity of "suing the need." Men of vision are behind the inception and execution of every great work accomplished. Then, having caught the vision, it is imperative to enlist in the Master's work as the soldier realizing his country's need enlists in this great war now raging. ANOTHER SHIP LOAD FOR BELGIANS.

HALIFAX, Nov. 28.—Freighted deep with the gifts of Nova Scotians and other Canadians to the war-ridden people of Belgium, the steamer Dorie, Captain Shadwick, will sail from Halifax this afternoon for Rotterdam. At three o'clock this afternoon the Dorie will be expected to draw away from Pier Nine, Richmond, and steam down the harbor and out to sea. The ship will fly the Nova Scotia and Belgian flags at her foremast head, and can be easily distinguished from other steamers in the port. As in the case of the Tremorah, Nova Scotia's first Ship of Mercy, the Dorie's cargo is composed mostly of the contributions of the people of this Province. Approximately 172 car loads of supplies, food and clothing for the stricken Belgians have been placed in the Dorie's holds, and of this amount over 100 car loads have been provided by the people of

NOVA SCOTIA.

The approximate values of the total contributions of the Provinces to the Dorie's cargo are as follows: Nova Scotia, \$202,000; New Brunswick, \$49,000; Prince Edward Island, \$4,500; Quebec and Ontario, \$125,000. The total is \$380,500. Montreal has contributed largely to the supplies provided by Quebec and Ontario. The stevedores engaged in loading the Dorie have been working with creditable speed of late in order to enable the ship to sail today, and it is considered safe to say that not long after three o'clock this afternoon she will be underway and heading down the harbor.
