AMERICAN ROAD CONGRESS

DETROIT, MICH., Sept. 29.—The third American Road Congress, held under the auspices of the American Highway Association, the American Automobile Association and the Michigan State Good Roads Association was called to order here this morning at the Wayne Gardens by Logan Wallace Page, the president of the Congress. There were addresses by Woodbridge N. Ferris, governor of Michigan; Oscar B. Marx, mayor of Detroit; President Page, Laurens Eino, president of the American Automobile Association and others.
Among the delegates in attendance at the congress which is by far the largest ever held in this country, are representatives of thirty States of the Union, delegates representing scores of organizations interested in the subject of good roads, representatives of the Federal Government, of the American Bar Association, the American Bankers' Association, the Travelers' Protective Association, the National Association of Road Machinery and Material Manufacturers and many others.
President Wilson, who is greatly interested in the good roads movement, has written a special address for this occasion, which will be read to the Congress. The day sessions of the Congress, which will close on October 4, will be held at the Wayne Gardens, while the evening sessions and the special meetings of the various associations represented by delegates will be held at the Hotel Ponchartraine and at other hotels.
In connection with the congress an unusually large and interesting exhibition of road machinery and materials is held, which is attracting considerable attention. Among the delegates to the convention as well as among the exhibitors Canada is well represented.

SIR ALFRED EAST DEAD

LONDON, Sept. 28.—Sir Alfred East president of the Royal Society of British Artists, died today. He was born in 1859.

Alfred East was knighted in 1910. He received gold medals at London, Paris, Munich and Barcelona. Some of his works are shown in the Carnegie art gallery, Pittsburg, art institutes, Chicago, and other American galleries.

CHINAMAN WAS MYSTERIOUSLY SHOT.

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 27.—What the police believe may be an outbreak of Chinese Tongz commenced on Thursday, when Lim Bat Lum was shot through the body three times while sleeping in his bunk in a shack near Colwood near this city.

A certain mystery attaches to the wounding of the Chinaman in its similarity to the untraced murder of Samuel Campbell, on the old Indian Reserve here, whose body was found August 21 riddled with bullets.

In the case of Lim Bat Lum, a board was pried off his shack and the assailant then inserted his hand containing the weapon, and discharged five shots at the sleeping Chinese. The bullets found in the same calibre as those which were found in Campbell's body. Three shots entered the Chinaman's body, but failed to kill.

the course of his address he said: The problem before the world today is the same as when Jesus Christ lived. Men looked out of their windows and saw degradation, saw people suffering physically, mentally, morally, saw what was spoken of nowadays as the lotus and jettison of life. But they had no aspiration to help, no desire to relieve the suffering, no sympathy with the lot of the submerged tenth. It was an age of indifference, and men did not trouble to find a solution for the then social problem.

Jesus Christ did not discuss the accountability or non-accountability of heredity in seeking to relieve the sufferings of humanity. He sought to deal with existing conditions, and the gospel he brought to relieve suffering humanity two thousand years ago, was the gospel of the present day. The crown of all the parables, the gospel within the gospel, was contained in the twenty-third gospel of Luke. In the story of the Prodigal Son Jesus Christ indicates that we are not safe when we disregard the safeguards of the home and of the church, the safeguards with which the Christian religion has surrounded us.

The parable of the Lost Coin illustrates how a woman through carelessness and indifference loses something which she values beyond measure, and when she realizes how great is her loss, and how impossible it is for her to get along without it she does not rest until it is found. To a Jewish woman the loss of a coin meant more than the loss of mere money; it meant the loss of prestige, the loss of honor. To-day, we find in centres of civilization where vice reigns the counterpart of the woman with the lost coin. They still had traces of their home training, of their family love, of their early religion—traces almost imperceptible. They are the lost coins of God's universe and we must not rest till we find them.

We live in a materialistic age, a materialism that permeates the church, the educational system, and almost every department of life almost to the destruction of our national honor and duty. We are careless of what affects our religious life, because we are so taken up with our material life.

The parable of the Prodigal Son shows us that sin begins in the home, in the church, in the very centre of the things which we believe minister to our welfare. The man became discontented with the humdrum life of his home, and as Dr. Herridge put it, went out in search of life and only saw death masking as life. We have hurled our condemnations at the elder brother, but is there a father or a mother living today who, if he or she had a heritage to leave, would not leave it to the elder son? If he left it to the younger he would be a vain imitator of the prodigal. In the broad path everything is alluring, everything pleasant, everything enticing to the young man leaving the quiet protection of his home, and he pursues the pleasures of life till satiety comes and disappointment.

In the North West of Canada today there are in superabundance the prototype of the prodigal son, men of great possibilities, whose lives have been blighted because of their wander-years. Of these it may be said whatever he willed, he will not work. He will throw his arms around his mother's neck, but take her last copper to squander. He may sit up at night with a sick friend, and it would be talked of for years to his credit. He may dote on his sisters, but never think of them when he seeks to gratify his passions. He may profess to abandon his ways and to be ashamed of his conduct, while still pursuing his evil courses.

We are sometimes told that these men became prodigals because they were brought up in the seclusion of a Christian home, and surrounded by the protecting influences of the Church, and then when they go out to face the world there is a re-action. It is not so. They become prodigals simply because they turn their backs upon their homes and all the holy influences that represents. God gives man free will; He does not coerce him to pursue a selected course. But if a child be trained to be good and if the right course be directed and protected from the temptations surrounding him when he goes out for the first time to the greater world beyond his home, he will not tread the prodigal's path.

It is therefore essential we should exercise the greatest care and vigilance in our dealings with the children in our homes and in the church. Are we surprised that some of the rising generation are leaving the paths of virtue and rectitude—forsaking the home and the church when they come in their inquiring years wanting? And the trouble is that they think the church that disappoints them stands for Christ—and so reject Him. If they came to the Fountain Head He will not give them a stone for bread nor a scorpion for fish. He will give them that which will satisfy their longings, and enable them to bear life's burdens cheerfully. It is not in the excitements of life, but in the daily routine God reveals himself.
