THURSDAY, AUGUST 15, 1901. THE WORLD'S WHEAT CROP.

We are naturally most interested in our own harvest prospects, and it is satisfactory to note that if the present prospects in Manitoba are realized Canada will have bread enough and to spare. In Ontario wheat promises to be a fair, but not abundant crop. Other Provinces than Manitoba and Ontario never produce enough wheat for home consumption. It is not therefore likely that the Canadian surplus for export will have any appreciable effect upon the markets of the world.

In the United States where there are conflicting accounts, the best estimates available give a total of say 700,000,000 bushels of fall and winter wheat together, or ten times the total Canadian yield, but with fifteen times the Canadian population to feed out of it. The fact is that with a rapidly growing population the Republic will probably in the years to come actually diminish its exports of wheat.

In the United Kingdom a cold spring was succeeded by a drought and the London Times figures upon about 87 per cent of a full wheat crop. Of necessity the Kingdom is always an enormously large importer of food-stuffs and will this year need to buy abroad quite as largely as in the average years of the past. From France, Germany, Austria, Hungary and Spain, from various causes, the report comes of wheat crops short of the average. Italian crops promise well, and Roumania would have a splendid yield but for storms.

Russia is usually a large exporter of wheat, and her territory is so vast that one portion sometimes suffers from famine while other parts have abundant crops. The general report from Russia appears to be that in the south west the crops are good, while elsewhere they have been greatly injured by storms and drought. The harvests of Australia and Argentina are yet months distant. (There is a wheat harvest somewhere almost every month in the year.) A general summing up would be a somewhat short wheat harvest, with probably still enough to go round. Both oats and corn will be distinctly short.

Some time ago there was much talk of a through line of steamers from Chicago direct to Europe. The first, and we believe the second of the new line actually made the trip eastward. Now it is given out that the entire scheme has been abandoned and the steamers will be utilized in other ways. This decision is the result of the high rates of insurance. It is the Lower St. Lawrence and the Gulf that appear to be most at fault. Then there is the fact that six large steamers have come to grief in the vicinity of Cape Race, within a few months. All of which is most regrettable.

It is not consoling to read that after the long and costly efforts of the Allied powers to bring about a settlement with China for the Boxer outrages, the great mass of the Chinese people think their Government has been victorious and hold all foreigners in greater contempt than before. It is said also that Kang Yi, the Chinese dignitary who was supposed to have been beheaded, is still alive and high in favor at court. A substitute suffered in his stead in the beheading process. The worst of it is that these conditions are painfully suggestive of the probability of other outrages upon foreigners in the future.

King Christian of Denmark, father-in-law of King Edward, is now an old man—he was born in 1818 and has been King since 1863. During nearly his entire reign he has stood in with the Conservative party in his Kingdom, although for a long time past the Liberals have been in large majority in the popular branch of the national Parliament. The King has at last, however, and for the first time in his reign, confided the reins of power to a Liberal. This is a great political overturn, but the King is well liked by his people and neither the Liberals nor Radicals of Denmark can be said to be disloyal. King Christian's popularity with the people will be increased by the recent political change.

THE HEIR AND LAWYERS. There was a merchant of Milan who left a fortune of £800,000, and 105 lawyers were employed by the heirs to dispute certain bequests. The case has just been settled; the lawyers have got £400,000, and the heirs have shared the remainder.
