Presbyterian and Church Union

Sir—The Presbyterian Witness, the official weekly organ of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, in its issue of May the thirteenth, makes an editorial reference to the situation regarding Union which is so incomplete as to be misleading. Any adequate statement of the position that confronts the Assembly in June next should include at least the following facts:

The Assembly (St. John) 1904, at the request of the Methodist Church, appointed a Committee on Union.

The Assembly (Kingston) of 1905, in adopting the report of the Union Committee, gave to the Church, as a condition of Union, that it "must carry the consent of the entire membership."

The Assembly (Ottawa) of 1911, asked a vote of the people. This vote gave one hundred and thirty thousand for Union and more than fifty thousand against Union, in a total membership of practically three hundred thousand.

The Assembly (Edmonton) of 1912, "in view of the extent of the minority," halted the movement, but expressed the hope of "practically unanimous action... Within a reasonable time."

The Assembly (Kingston) 1915, after a pause of three years, asked the people for a second vote. This vote gave approximately one hundred and thirty thousand for Union and seventy-three thousand against Union, in a total membership of three hundred and thirty eight thousand. In the three years the membership had increased about forty thousand, the votes against Union had increased twenty three thousand, the votes for Union only six hundred!

THE OLD GARDENER SAYS

It's a shame to feed cut worms on tender young plants. The cut worms can be followed when young plants are set out if collars of pasboard or paper are wrapped around the stems. An easy way to make these collars is to cut cardboard into strips three inches wide. Sections are then to be cut off and rolled around a lead pencil to form a tube. Have the protectors an inch below the surface and at least two inches above. This is much easier than hunting for cut worms with a lantern at night, as is sometimes done.

HIDES CHEAPER BUT LITTLE HOPE FOR CHEAPER SHOES

There will be fluctuations in shoe prices—some lines of brown low shoes went up a little last week—but there is no chance of any basic lowering of prices, declares the trade from the merchant shoe on the customer's foot. Manufacturers are not willing to ask factory hands to work for less money; how can they, they ask with rents and living costs at their present figures, and they emphasize that their men have not long since come through a long spell of short time and in many cases actual shut-downs, and are in no position to work for less money. Still a few had to spend all their savings in the struggle to keep going. The shoe business is "proceeding normally now," men are busy and contented they say, and further sacrifices cannot even be suggested. There is a tendency among manufacturers to deplore the public insistence on novelty styles since the former are costly to make, must have only the highest grades of leather, and in brogues and strap shoes take more than one thickness of leather. A return to the standard lines would, it is averred assist in lowering prices since novelties change so frequently, and are the cause of losses to makers and sellers. Novelties must cost more than standard lines, but at the present time retailers and manufacturers declare are based on sound value.

PROFITS WIPE OUT

"Retailers have just come through a year when wiped out their profits and cut deep into their resources," said George G. Gales, president of the Shoe Retailers' Association of Canada. "They took very serious losses and are still doing all they can to keep prices down. We know quite well they are higher than they were in 1914, but it is impossible for them to get lower for a long time. We can't buy shoes wholesale at 1914 prices, any more than we can anything we need in our business. We used to get cartons for a cent and a half, now they are eight or nine cents, deliveries used to cost five cents, but now from fourteen to fifteen cents. We are passing on every reduction we can, and our prices are based on replacement value—except in the case of a few small firms in the unhappy position of not being able to take the loss that has in general been taken by the retail trade. A good shoe which in 1914 cost say \$7, cannot now be sold for less than \$9.50," continued Mr. Gales. "Don't for a moment think you are going to get shoes at pre-war

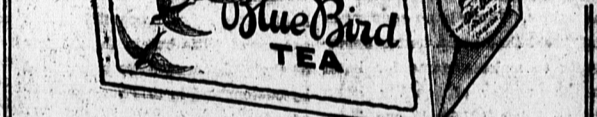

"The public recognizes that we are doing everything possible," he added, "because they are buying right along, and we are doing good business. They know as we do that shoe prices cannot go lower—and we had the heart taken out of us sufficiently by last year's depression."

NO LOWER

"On staple shoes, black and brown calf, kid and skin shoes, prices are now practically equal to those before the war," insisted Peter A. Doig, director and general sales manager of the Tetrault Shoe Manufacturing Co., Ltd. "Taking into consideration that wages will not, and cannot, be expected to go back to pre-war rates. Wages are about 25 per cent. higher than then, and shoe prices are about the same amount higher. The public cannot expect them to go lower. Shoe prices are as normal now, compared to other goods, as they were before the war."
