Call for tenders for Steamship Service Between Quebec and Natashquan

TENDERS for a Passenger, Freight and Mail Steamship service are invited and will be received at the office of the Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, until noon of the fifteenth day of December, 1913.

Tenders must be submitted on the printed forms for that purpose which will be supplied on application to the undersigned and are to be sent in sealed envelopes addressed to "The Hon. the Minister of Trade and Commerce" and are to be marked "Tenders for Steamship Service between Quebec and Natashquan" and submitted through the post about to be registered.

The service is to consist of regular sailings from Quebec to Natashquan and return as follows: Every 10 days from such date as the ice conditions in the River St. Lawrence will permit up to May 15th, every 7 days from May 15th to November 15th, and every 10 days from November 15th until the ice conditions in the River St. Lawrence will no longer permit of the running of a steamer over the said route.

The Ports of Call each way shall be as follows: Les Escoumies, Manicouagan, Grand Pointe, Les Amis, Tricity Bay, Seven Islands, Moisie, Sheldrake, Thunder River, Magpie, St. John's, Long Point, Mingan and Kouchibouctou, and such reasonable modification or variation thereof as may be determined from time to time by the Minister.

The contract to be for a period of five years from the opening of navigation as above described up to May 15th, 1914. The contractor is to land and embark mail at all Ports of Call at his own cost and expense.

O'Neal this morning urged the delegates to use every legitimate means of increasing the number of farmers in the State. There is room for thousands of intelligent, stock-raising farmers in the State. The keynote of the three days' congress is certain to be the question of increasing the amount of live stock on Alabama farms. When the South is more fully recognized as holding the key to the nation's meat supply, land values will soar, according to the judgment of most of those present. Joseph O. Thompson, the largest farm operator in the State presided at today's session.

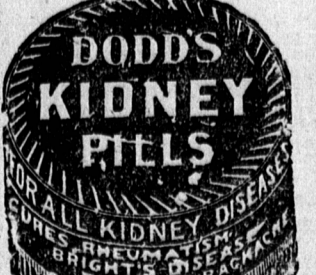
