Cucumber Growing Discussed

Mr. H.P. Banks, sales supervisor of Matthew-Wells Co., Ltd., Guelph, Ont., was present at an informal meeting of the Town Council and Board of Trade on Tuesday evening in the Town Hall, Summerside, for the purpose of hearing particulars of a plan proposed by his company for the contracting for the growing of cucumbers by farmers of this Province. Mayor J.P. Arnett presided.

The Matthew-Wells Co., Ltd. are manufacturers of pickles and preserves and Mr. Wells stated that his company would also be interested in the future in the purchasing of strawberries, raspberries and other fruits. He said he had been to several points in the Province and the indications are favourable to the securing of the acreage required. He explained that they are concentrating on the contracting for cucumbers this year as this crop can be taken in next fall. If plans work out his company will erect a receiving plant in the Province in the near future for the handling and curing of various commodities. He passed around a sketch showing the kinds of cucumbers required.

Mr. Banks was accompanied by Mr. Gordon C. Warren of the Dominion Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, who spoke briefly on the cultivation of cucumbers. Mr. R.A. Profit, Pictou, and Mr. J. Lorne Driscoll spoke briefly. Mr. Driscoll said he had grown a small quantity of cucumbers without difficulty. Mayor Arnett expressed appreciation of the visit of these gentlemen and said he felt sure that if the farmers went into this industry it would be a good success. He promised the assistance of the Town in any way.

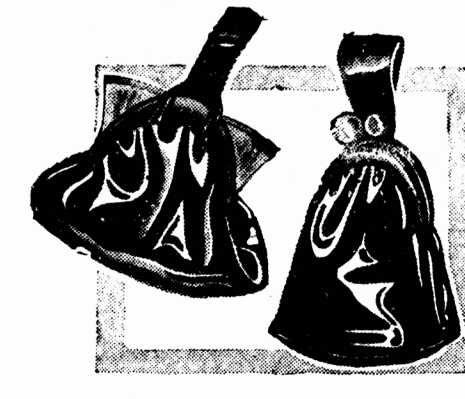
