PALACE SOON

Royal Family Prepares To Quit Piccadilly Home For Buckingham.

LONDON, Jan. 18—(AP)—Queen Elizabeth won't have to attend to paying the butcher and the laundryman when she moves into Buckingham Palace, but she will be confronted with a tremendous housekeeping problem.

A master of the household will take over most of the domestic routine that the Queen has handled in the comparatively modest residence she and the King occupy at 145 Piccadilly.

But in the vast Palace of hundreds of rooms, she will be busy for many weeks getting settled, choosing her ladies-in-waiting and directing alterations in the Royal apartments.

King George and Queen Elizabeth plan to move within a few weeks. When they do, the Duke and Duchess of Kent—the Duke is the Sovereign's youngest brother—may follow them into 145 Piccadilly.

The present home of the Kents, at three Belgrave Square, has proved too small for his enlarged staff and some of the household officials have had to be accommodated in other buildings.

One of Queen Elizabeth's first tasks when she moves to Buckingham Palace will be the selection of a nursery for Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret Rose, her two daughters.

Then she will face staff problems.

At 145 Piccadilly, there were only 10 servants, including two nurses and a gardener.

Buckingham Palace has 150 servants, besides court officials, ladies-in-waiting and secretaries.

The actual suite to be occupied by the King and Queen contains moderate-sized rooms, which formerly were occupied by the King's late father and Queen Mary. The new monarchs do not wish to live in the ground-floor Belgian suite which Edward used during his brief stay in the Palace.

The bright-coloured, rather formal sampler patterns are carried out on harlequin dinner mat sets each in a different colour, complete with matching napkins.

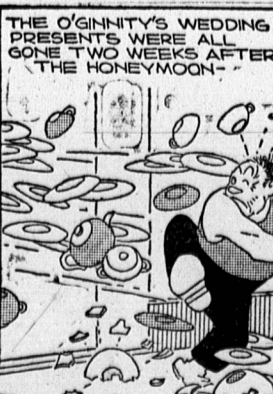
SOCIAL CHAT

VENIOT URGES
ABOLITION
OF RELIEF

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
OTTAWA, Jan. 18—Complete abolition of direct unemployment relief was urged in the House of Commons today by Dr. C. J. Veniot, new Liberal member for Gloucester, as he seconded the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne.

Citing results achieved in his home town of Bathurst and in New Brunswick generally by the cutting down of relief payments Dr. Veniot suggested the rest of Canada should adopt a similar policy.

Direct relief was the greatest economic error of the century. It might have been necessary as a temporary measure at the start of the depression.

"The continuation," he said, "as a 'state-subsidized' form of charity, as the subsidizing of idleness, without asking any return in the shape of human endeavor, is sapping the morals, the vitality and the finances of the country, because of the 'destructive' principle that it fosters in supporting idleness, whether forced or voluntary, as opposed to the natural law of compensation, of work and production.

"Mind in action through creative constructive thinking, is the greatest force in the world. Work, production, whether in the intellectual or material field is mind's greatest manifestation, the basic principle of all human success and economic progress, one of the fundamental laws of the universe; and idleness, whether voluntary or forced, is the bane of humanity.

"It was the consideration and recognition of the basic principles just mentioned that prompted my home town of Bathurst in 1933 to discontinue direct relief or dole as a means of taking care of its 'so-called' unemployed, and the Province of New Brunswick, through the efforts of Premier Dwyer and his colleagues, is endeavoring to carry out the same policy for the entire province.

"I say 'so-called' unemployed, because we discovered that direct relief was being turned into a racket by nearly 80 per cent of the seeking assistance. On Jan. 1, 1935 the unemployed numbered 1,500 out of a total population of 3,300.

"On May 1 of that year we voted out direct relief, and adopted the slogan 'no work, no bread,' from the town of Bathurst; if an unemployed laborer will not work, neither shall he eat at the expense of the tax-payers.

After this men found ways of standing on their own feet. The town had to care for only the ordinary indigents, sick and maimed.

It did not follow the plan would work everywhere in Canada, he said, but men could never be got to look for work as long as they could obtain maintenance by holding out their hands.

PREDICTS SHOWDOWN BETWEEN FASCISM AND COMMUNISM

Goering Concludes Talks With Duce On Spanish Civil War Situation.

ROME, Jan. 18—(AP)—Prediction of an eventual showdown in the conflict between Europe's Fascists and Communists was made by General Hermann Goering in a speech here last night, a reliable person who was present told the Associated Press tonight.

Reichschancellor Hitler's chief aide, who has been visiting Rome on a mission understood to be of great political significance, left today for Naples and Capri.

Last night he addressed a private meeting of the German Club of Rome. One of his hearers said he described Europe as divided between countries "of order, enlightenment and good faith" and those of "destruction and bloodshed."

"A great test will demonstrate which of these two will prevail in Europe," Hitler's lieutenant was quoted as having said.

British Ambassador Sir Eric Drummond started for London after conferring with Foreign Minister Galeazzo Ciano.

High Fascists declared Italy's answer to Britain's recent note asking a complete stoppage of volunteer enlistments to Spain might take into account the report of the Valencia regime's naturalization of foreign fighters.

These sources said the order as published in the Valencia administration's official gazette.

Gayda, writing in Giornale d'Italia, called the naturalization "only a farce," adding:

"It is destined to cover human contraband going to Spain and forestall the open and clear-cut proposals of Italy and Germany to remove all foreigners participating in the war."

"It will be enough, in fact," he said, "for the volunteers destined to the Red Spanish front to present themselves at the border furnished with a Spanish passport—the virtue of the automatic neutralizations accorded by the Valencia decree—to overcome in perfect freedom all possible control by international inspection."
