PLEADED GUILTY TO CHARGE OF SELLING BAD PICTURES.

EDMONTON, November 7.—After suggesting insanity as a possible defense to charges of breaking certain of the laws of Canada, Edwin C. Blair broke down and wept bitterly in the district court at Edson yesterday afternoon, creating a scene quite unusual in cases of that character.

Blair was up for trial before Judge Noel on a complaint containing three counts, in effect accusing him of having made and sold obscene photographs at Dandurand, Alta., on August 14th, last. Blair was at first inclined to fight the action brought against him, but upon learning of the rigid provisions of the law relating to the handling of lewd pictures, and that the authorities everywhere in Canada insisted on enforcing the law, he then changed his mind and accepted the inevitable consequences of his acts.

However, Blair was resourceful and asked if an insane man should be sent to jail. He thereupon produced a bunch of letters showing that at one time he had been an inmate of an insane asylum in Illinois.

But there was nothing in his appearance or actions to indicate that he was not now of sound mind.

Blair pleaded guilty to the charges, and Judge Noel accordingly sentenced him to a term of six months in jail at Port Saskatchewan. Blair told that he had influential relatives in Nova Scotia. He is a travelling photographer, and has seen much of the country, both in Canada and the United States. He was married once but later secured a divorce he said.
