Principal speaker at Tuesday night's meeting of the Charlottetown Y's Men's Club was Mr. James Betts of Richmond, Virginia, international president of the organization. President Roy Cudmore was chairman.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon Rev. Clarence E. Helms, of the Anglican Cathedral Church, Fall River, Mass. Herbert Harold Shaw, chief superintendent of education for Prince Edward Island, received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

William S. H. Crawford, Saint John, N. B., received the degree of Bachelor of Science in 1939, was valedictorian. Gerald Elkin, Saint John, President of the graduating class, presented the degree to Mr. Crawford.

Crawford was awarded a life membership in the Alumni Society given to the graduating student who has made the best general average during his course.

In 1901 he returned to McGill where he spent a year, completed his Engineering course and received the degree of B. Sc.

In 1902 he rejoined the staff of Prince of Wales College in his former capacity, remaining with that institution till 1911, when he left to take a position on the staff of the University of British Columbia, in Vancouver.

In 1912, after spending a year in that institution, he returned to Prince Edward Island and was appointed Chief Engineer of the Provincial Department of Public Works.

In 1915 he became Chief Superintendent of Education, retaining also the office of Provincial Engineer.

In 1919 he retired from the former office and was Engineer only till 1924.

In the latter year he was re-appointed Chief Superintendent of Education and also remained Provincial Engineer, occupying the two offices until 1931, when he retired as Engineer and since then has held the former office only.

For a number of years he was Supervisor of the city schools.

In 1929 he attended the World Federation of Educational Associations in Geneva, and in 1937 was the guest of the National Council of Education at the Coronation in London.
