—WHO OWNS THE WHALE?—During the past several years a variety of deep sea inhabitants have wandered into Summerside harbour, intent perhaps upon investigating this locality as a permanent home. Most of them have fallen prey to the skill of local fishermen as for instance the large black porpoise "lasted" by Mr. Lucas Allen a couple of seasons ago and "tethered" with a rope at the marine wharf as positive proof of his piscatorial prowess. Over the week end another visitor definitely classified this time by responsible eyewitnesses as a whale was cavorting in the vicinity of "Coles' Wharf", occasionally emitting a stream of water high into the air in a frolicsome way, probably just revelling in the joy of being alive. There being no one on hand to lass this fellow the residents of the locality turned out with shotguns and muskets and poured volley after volley into the offending whale, if such he is, with the intention presumably of salvaging the carcass for fox feed. However, with the turning of the tide Moby Dick floated over to the opposite shore and landed on Schurman's Point and so up to yesterday the ownership of the two ton mammal appeared to be in dispute. Some authorities contend that the remains belong to the sharpshooters while another school of thought argue that as possession is nine points of the law he belongs to the man who owns the land on which he landed. It would seem that unless the matter is settled shortly its all going to develop into a whale of a problem for someone if the warm weather continues.—S.

to the manner in which he had carried on his work while acting as secretary of the Board. Mr. George Melkie of the Town Improvement Committee brought in a slate of recommendations which were to be passed on to the Town Council for their consideration. Mr. Melkie pointed out that several recommendations had been passed to the Council some time ago and nothing had been done about them so far.

Speaking for the Town Council, Mr. Lloyd Gorrell said that among these recommendations had been the cleaning up of the water front and that the Town was at present working on this. The matter of an incinerator, which had also been recommended, had been gone into and found to be much too expensive. Mr. Gorrell pointed out also that streets which the committee had recommended be paved could not be done due to the lack of cement.

Mr. John E. Campbell of the marine committee said that since the last meeting of the Board two of the largest cargoes ever to leave this port had been shipped out. He said that the English agent had complimented the local agent for the splendid way the loading had been done and that he was much better satisfied with the way the work had been carried out than in Saint John.

The matter of the condition of the wharf was given some discussion by the Board and Mr. Campbell said that for the all shipping the Marine Wharf will require a lot of repair work to get it into shape. Mr. T. J. Immen pointed out that these shipments of potatoes had been a God send to the farmers in this locality and wished to know if steps were being taken to have the wharf put in proper shape to carry the heavy loads required. Mr. Immen also suggested that some steps be taken to dredge out the harbor as it had been some years since any work of this nature had been done.

port be asked to make a survey of the harbour with a view of having it deepened where needed.

Reporting for the publicity and tourist committee Mr. Alan Holman backed up the recommendations made by Mr. Melkie of the Town Improvement Committee and hoped that when the Town puts on its "clean up week" that it will do a bit of cleaning up itself, especially along the waterfront. Mr. Holman announced that his committee had gone into the matter of opening a tourist bureau in Summerside and engaging a man to operate it and had passed their recommendations along to the Town Council which he believed would act favorably on the matters in the near future. Mr. Holman read a letter to the Board announcing that on September 23-24-25 the annual convention of the Canadian Association of Tourists and Publicity Bureaus would be held at the Charlottetown Hotel. It was announced that this delegation

would visit Summerside while in the Province and suggested that some steps be taken to entertain these visitors who are outstanding figures in tourist and publicity promotion from all parts of Canada as well as prominent railway and steamship officials. On the recommendation of the Board the letter was to be turned over to the Town Council for action.—S.
