EGG CIRCLE

Notes on the Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest for the Twenty-first week, ending March 29th

There was a gain of two eggs during the past week, making a total of 910. There were only four hens that did not contribute to the weekly total; the production for the week was 65% of the possible.

Mr. J. P. Hooper's Barred Rocks tied with the Experimental Station's pen of Barred Rocks No. 10 for first place with 53 eggs; the Experimental Station's pen of Leghorns No. 13 was second, with 51 eggs; Mrs. F. Halliday's Barred Rocks for third place, with 50 eggs each; the Experimental Station's pens of Leghorns Nos. 12 and 14, tied for fourth place, with 49 eggs each.

Mr. A. Wanser's White Wyandottes tied with D. F. McDonald's Barred Rocks for 5th place with 48 eggs each; Mrs. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns were sixth, with 45 eggs, and Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns were seventh, tying with Mr. Sam McPherson's pen, with 44 eggs each.

Mr. Howard Rogers' White Wyandottes tied with the Experimental Station's pen of Leghorns No. 15 for 8th place, with 43 eggs each; Mr. Joseph Carmichael's Barred Rocks tied with Mr. H. L. Machon's Barred Rocks for ninth place, with 41 eggs each; Rev. A. MacAulay's Barred Rocks tied with Edward Dillitt's White Leghorns and with Mr. J. J. McGilivray's White Leghorns for tenth place, with 40 eggs each.

The Experimental Station's pens of Leghorns Nos. 14, 15, 12 and 15 are first, second, third and fourth to date, with 786, 760, 743 and 632 eggs respectively. Mr. Edward Bullitt's were 5th, with 623 eggs; closely followed by Sam McPherson's Leghorns that have laid 626 eggs.

Twelve hens have laid 90 eggs or over, the Experimental Farm hen No. 141 is still leading with 140 eggs.
