REV. MR. HENNINGAR, who will leave shortly for Japan, there to engage in missionary work, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward S. Hennigar, Orange street. Mr. Hennigar was educated at the local public schools and graduated from the High School in 1887. He then entered the University of Mount Allison at Sackville, N. B. After a course marked by much success he received the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1902 and was at the same time awarded an Honors Certificate for his work in classics. Following his graduation, Mr. Hennigar took up ministerial work under the direction of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Methodist conference. In the fall of 1904 he again entered Mount Allison, this time as a student in the Faculty of Theology, having been pursuing some of the studies on the Divinity course prior to returning to the university. He was ordained to the work of the ministry at the last session of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island conference at Charlottetown. Mr. Hennigar is sent to Japan as a missionary by the General Board of Missions of the Methodist Church of Canada, but his support in the field has been undertaken by the Epworth League of the N. B. and P. E. I. conference. It is probable that he will first labor in among the students of the Japanese schools and colleges. Mr. Hennigar addressed a meeting in Centenary church school room on Friday evening. In the course of his address he stated that about \$1,100 of the amount he expects to secure from the league has already been pledged, though but half of the conference has been canvassed. Mr. Hennigar left this morning for Prince Edward Island to visit leagues there.—St. John Globe.

CIRCULARS from English buyers indicate a somewhat favorable market for early Canadian apples. These reports will undoubtedly stimulate shipments, and there may be a temptation on the part of the shippers to send forward immature and uncolored fruit. Such fruit will not grade No 1, or XXX. Section 7 of the fruit marks act reads as follows:—No person shall sell, or offer, expose, or have in his possession for sale any fruit packed in a close package, upon which package is marked any designation which represents such fruit as of No 1, or XXX, finest, best, or extra good quality, unless such fruit consists of well grown specimens of one variety, sound, of nearly uniform size of good color for the variety, of normal shape and not less than ninety per cent free from seal, worm holes, bruises and other defects, and properly packed.

EASTERN NOTES.—Hay making is now general, every available hand at work. The season is a little later on account of wet weather the first of the month. Our roads present a dreary monotony save for the carriage of an occasional pedlar, sometimes of local origin, sometimes of oriental lineage, sometimes unknown nationality. Conspicuous among them is the cloth vendor who appears pretty regularly this season and must find this a favorable stamping ground. It may be noticed I have not prefixed the adjective "Sho dy" which is generally connected with his business, perhaps on account of the tender susceptibilities of some of his patrons. For forty years he has plied his trade in this section at irregular intervals and each time a new story to settle the doubts of his country customers, bankrupt, smuggled or shipwrecked being the most numerous.—Our fishermen are catching a few hake on the south side, struggling with two difficulties, or rather three the last few days viz., a shortage of bait, a scarcity of fish, and a surplus of dog-fish.—Mrs. Samuel McDonald of Dundas, and her daughter Mrs. Jones of Quincey, Mass., have been visiting their eastern friends—Miss Euphemia McLean of Dundas, and her brother Joseph D. McLean now of Boston also paid us a flying visit. They were the guests of their sister, and brother-in-law, Silas S. Robertson. Several of our young men purpose joining the harvest excursion on the 19th. As a rule they don't take to life on the prairies of the west; the instincts of the sea brings longing for the rolling of the ocean, the beating of the surf in the strand and the invigorating saline breezes that impart iron to the blood and strength to the constitution.—Com.
