C. N. R. EARNINGS

MONTREAL, May 3.—Increases of \$1,128,292.43 or 5.13 per cent in gross earnings and \$71,680.53 or 1.66 per cent in net earnings are shown by the operating summary for the Canadian National Railways during the month of March 1927, as compared with March of last year. Working expenses during the period increased by \$1,056,611.90 or 5.97 per cent and the operating ratio for the month was 81.05 per cent as against 80.40 per cent in March, 1926.

For the first three months of the present calendar year, gross earnings of the Canadian National Sys-

tem are shown to be \$62,512,461.00, an increase of \$3,465,355.62 or 5.87 per cent over the earnings for the corresponding period of 1926. During the period, working expenses increased by \$3,087,034.39 or 5.98 per cent, to a total of \$54,668,829.64, while net earnings for the three months were \$7,843,631.36, an increase of \$378,321.23 or 5.07 per cent over those for the first three months of last year. The operating ratio for the first three months of 1927 was 87.45 per cent, against 87.36 per cent in the similar period of 1926.

Committee Making Every Effort To Get Very Best Out

EASTERN CANADA SECTIONAL MEET AWARDED TO SAINT JOHN AND WESTERN TO EDMONTON, ASSISTANCE FOR ATHLETES; THE STANDARD.

The Canadian Olympic Committee is making an extended effort this year to have the Dominion well represented at the 1928 Olympic Games. The country will be combed from coast to coast for athletes of the highest possible calibre. At the annual meeting of the Olympic Committee, held in conjunction with the annual A. A. U. meeting at the Admiral Beatty Hotel here last December, P. J. Mulqueen, chairman of the Olympic Committee, announced that standards would be set in each event and athletes in the various provinces would be required to measure up to these before becoming eligible to compete in the sectional trials, the Canadian Championships at Toronto and later in the Olympic trials at Montreal.

TO GIVE ASSISTANCE

These in brief are the plans of the committee. Further they will assist the athletes to the extent of the branch of the A. A. U. in question, one half the railway and sleeping car expenses of the athletes they wish to send to sectional meets. The branch may send such athletes as they desire to the meets on their own behalf if they desire to meet their whole expenses, whether the athletes in question measured up to the standards or not.

Early Symptoms of Tuberculosis Defined

Tuberculosis begins in different ways, usually the beginning is gradual. 1. Fatigue. In many cases long before a slight cough appears

Loss of Appetite: This is a very suggestive early sign of tuberculosis, your usual good appetite begins to fall, or it varies from day to day. Pay attention to these early symptoms. Do not wait until your disease has become far advanced or possibly hopeless.
