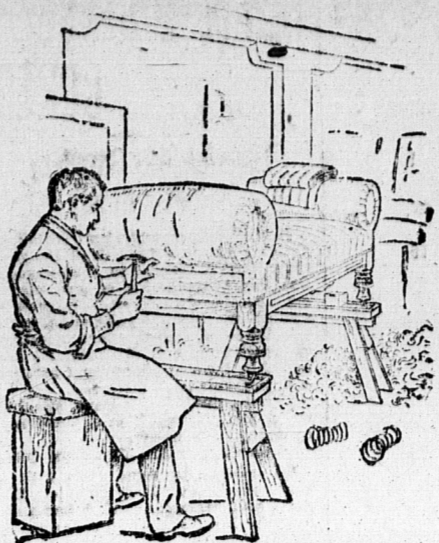

MEN CLING TO RIGGING OF A SUNKEN SCHOONER

BEAUFORT, N. C., Jan. 19—Six or seven men, the crew of an unidentified three-masted schooner which early today was wrecked on the treacherous Diamond Shoals, are clinging to the topmasts and rigging of their sunken vessel, while life-savers and revenue cutters are making frantic efforts to rescue them.

When the vessel struck the shoals the life-savers from several nearby stations who saw the vessel go down and watched the men take to the rigging hastened to their boats but fog set in before they reached the spot.

The predicament of the shipwrecked men was learned on the Diamond Shoals lightship and wireless calls were sent out for assistance. The calls were picked up by the revenue cutters Itasca, cruising off the Carolina coast and the Onondaga, at work in Chesapeake bay. Immediately the cutters sent word they were on their way.

The life-savers have been unable to locate the wreck in the heavy fog while every minute lost is lessening the chance of success.

DYNAMITE EXPLOSION IN HEART OF PUEBLO, COL.

PUEBLO, Col., Jan 19—A terrific dynamite explosion early today partly wrecked the Colorado laundry, in the heart of the business district of this city and damaged the office of the Globe express company. City detectives who immediately began an investigation found a dynamite fuse in the alley outside of the express office.

The laundry, one of the largest in the west, is a non-union plant. It is believed the object was to destroy a large tank used as a water softener. When this was being erected several years ago it mysteriously toppled over one night. The tank was erected by a Chicago Heights, Ill. company.

AGED HERMIT FOUND IN A HUT DYING

MANCHESTER, N. H., Jan. 19—Charles Lambert, aged 80, an eccentric Englishman, who for 30 years or more has lived the life of a hermit near Mosquito pond, about four miles from this city, was found in his hut last night nearly dead. Sickness and hunger had him low.

A telephone message to Chief of police in the evening conveyed the information that the hermit had not been seen for some weeks and officers were sent to make an investigation. Finding no reply to repeated knocks at the door, the officers forced an entrance and found the aged hermit stretched on a couch, helpless and dying of hunger, having been unable because of illness to help himself in any way for a number of days.

Lambert was scantily clad and was neither food nor fire, and that he was not attacked and killed by the rats which had eaten the shoes from his feet is a miracle. He was wrapped in blankets and taken to the Sacred Heart hospital by the officers, where, because of his age and weakened condition, the outcome of his experience could not be determined last night.

Little is known of Lambert's antecedents. He came to this vicinity many years ago and it is said because of a disappointment in love affairs purchased a number of acres of land in the vicinity of Mosquito pond and has lived the life of a hermit ever since. He is an English subject, having always refused to take out naturalization papers. Because of his eccentric ways and manner of living he was one of the well known characters of this vicinity.
