—POULTRY MEETING.—Mr. Benson, the Dominion Poultryman, addressed a meeting in Carleton School house on June 5th. The meeting opened at 8 o'clock with President Cameron in the chair who, in a few words, introduced Mr. Benson. He gave a brief history of the growth of the poultry business followed by a strong appeal for a better quality of eggs, at the present there is a loss of 17 per cent on all the eggs produced in Canada. There should be information of eggs and shopped poultry to get the best price. Be sure and keep a pure breed and give them a good run, do not coop them up and give the chickens plenty of sour milk to drink but do not give them anything until they are 48 hours old. He strongly recommended the cotton front for the poultry house and deep plenty of mixed grain where the women can easily get it for the hens, then they will be well fed. Mr. Benson spoke of egg circles and advised the people to think the matter over. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer and suitably acknowledged. The Tryon meeting on the next evening was on the same lines the only drawback was the small attendance but those present were well repaid, and when Mr. Benson comes again he will have more to hear him as the people were very busy trying to finish their planting which has been delayed very much by the wet weather.

—WHORST BOMB IN PORTUGAL

LISBON, Portugal, June 10.—One person was killed and a number of others wounded by a bomb thrown to-day at a procession in honor of Portugal's great epic and poet, Luis de Camoens, while it was passing through the Rue du Carmo, the principal business street of the Portuguese capital. The bomb thrower was wounded by a splinter from his own missile. When taken to the hospital he declared that he wished to commit suicide.

The procession was suddenly attacked by a band of men who came from a side street, carrying a black flag. During the scuffle the bomb exploded. The wounded, to the number of 33, were taken to hospitals.

LONDON, June 11.—There was a great outpouring of London society today for the opening of the Noah's Ark Fair in Albert Hall. The fair, which will continue two days, is given in aid of a London hospital. Queen Alexandra is the patron of the fair and the duchess of Marlborough, the Countess of Lonsdale and a number of other women in the highest ranks of the nobility are among the members of the committee.

The delighted throngs that wandered through the aisles of the big hall at the opening this afternoon afforded evidence that the fair one of the promoters to make the fair one of the "biggest and best" ever given in the metropolis had met with success. Novel and attractive features were to be encountered at every turn. Not the least attractive was the "American bar," where so-called American mixed drinks were dispensed to the thirsty. Lord Lonsdale presided as chief bar-keeper and was assisted in making up the beverages by Prince Paul of Serbia Count Elsen and Prince Obelenski.

BOOKER WASHINGTON AT COMMENCEMENT

WASHINGTON, June 10.—As interpreted by it, the supreme court today upheld the constitutionality of the newspaper publicity law, enacted as a part of the Postal Appropriation act of 1912. The particular section attacked was to bar every newspaper and periodical from the mails unless the editors or owners filed with the postal authorities semi-annual sworn statements, giving the names of the editors, owners, stockholders and bondholders, and the average daily circulation, and thereafter immediately published the statement. It also forbade, under penalty of a fine, the publication of paid-for articles without marking them "advertisement."

A bitter fight, led by the Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bureau of New York, was made against the law.

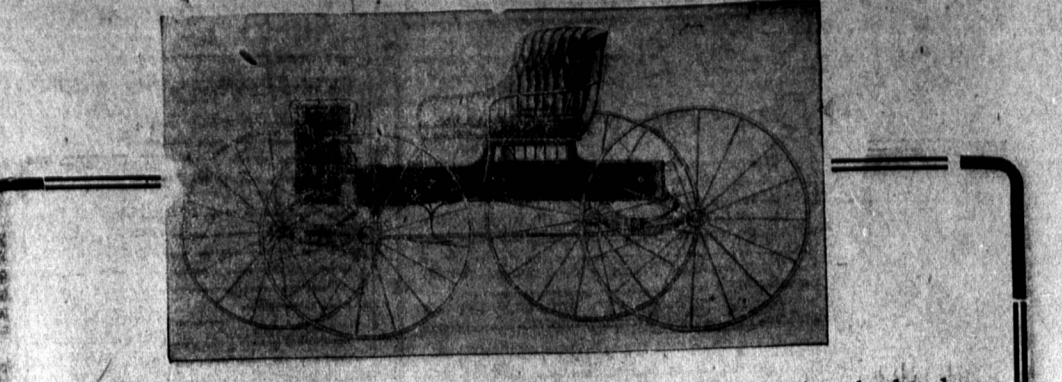

ALWAYS CONSULT THE PHONE DIRECTORY.

Almost every day The Guardian reprints an advertising notice. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or in the Evening Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same, all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item, the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order. The Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly for regular business. In all such cases for advertising of churches & charities as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time.

People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notice of a concert, lecture, or social picnic, etc., are chargeable if there is an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even though a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verses accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Evening Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.

The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.
