BRITAIN NAMES NEW ENVOY TO MOSCOW

Sir Stafford Cripps Charged with Improving Relations With Soviets.

LONDON, June 5.—(CP)—Sir Stafford Cripps, left wing Labor leader, was named Britain's ambassador to Soviet Russia tonight and qualified sources said he was charged with the mission of improving Anglo-Soviet relations.

Sir Stafford is already en route to Moscow.

The King approved his appointment to the important ambassadorial post, in succession to Sir William Seeds, as Russian circles here acknowledged that Russia and the British-French Allies have common interests in the Black Sea and the eastern Mediterranean.

This view was accompanied by studied emphasis in these same circles that Russia is determined to avoid involvement in the war "on one side or the other."

May Influence Italy

An important offshoot of the improved relations between Russia, Germany's economic partner, and the Allies was the hope expressed by one British source that this new state of affairs may make Italy hesitant to enter the war.

But Italy's plunge into the conflict still is regarded by most British as a matter of time.

Indication that France is working with Britain for a better understanding with Russia was seen in the fact that at the same time as Sir Stafford's appointment was made known, Moscow agreed to accept Erik Labonne, former French envoy to the Spanish Republic regime, as the new French Ambassador to Russia, succeeding Paul Emile Nazziari.

The retiring British and French Ambassadors had been away from their Moscow posts for some months. They left following break-down of the "peace front" talks and the strain in Allied-Russian relations resulting from the Soviet invasion of Finland.

Sir Stafford, member of the House of Commons, had just returned from a trip to the Far East during which he was said to have flown to Moscow and interviewed Joseph Stalin.

Britain originally had intended sending the Labor leader as a special envoy to discuss trade and political questions, but Russia indicated it would prefer to carry on talks through normal diplomatic channels.

Twofold Purpose

The Allies were said tonight to be pursuing, with "seemingly good prospects," their campaign for better relations with Russia with this twofold purpose in mind:

1. To check one leak in the blockade of Germany.
2. To strengthen the Allied position in the Balkans and Near East.

Friendship of Russia with Turkey, Britain's ally, is regarded as a means of strengthening at least diplomatic cooperation between the Allies and Russia in southeastern Europe.

Informed sources acknowledged they saw in Russian acceptance of Sir Stafford as the new Ambassador no great change in Russian policy and no true indication of a severance of German-Russian relations.

The Russians, however, are realistic and British opinion is that Adolf Hitler's expanding influence is creating definite concern in the Kremlin.

Great Britain stands to gain through Russian friendship a trade agreement by which she hopes to check the flow of some supplies by out-trading and out-bidding Germany.

She also would be relieved of one of the worries in the Near Eastern situation—that Russia might jump into the war on Germany's side.
