NEW BRUNSWICK RIFLEMEN SET RECORD

Amass Aggregate Score Of 804 At Bedford Defeating Island Team By Five Points

BEDFORD, N. S., June 17—(CP)—Marksmanship that set a new record today gave New Brunswick riflemen the Inter-Maritime Rifle Championship, fired for on Bedford Rifle Ranges by teams representing New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia.

Shooting an aggregate score of 804—just two more than the previous record set up last year by the Prince Edward Island squad—by reason of consistent firing on all three ranges, the 200, 500 and 600 yards, the winners had a five-point margin on the defending Island team.

Nova Scotia trailed one point behind the Prince Edward Island marksmen with 798.

IN THIS CORNER

Looking forward to a highly successful season the Holy Redeemer tennis courts officially open their season tonight when three exhibition games, played under the floodlights, will take place.

Ideal weather aided the New Brunswick marksmen in establishing the new record. Their showing was conceded by followers of the meet as remarkable because of the fact they had only one practice shoot at Bedford.

Consistency was the keynote of the New Brunswick riflemen at Bedford Ranges yesterday in the record-breaking performance they staged at the inter-maritime rifle meet at Halifax.

Winding up in second place with 799 points the Prince Edward Island squad also gave a fine account of themselves. They were particularly good at the 500 yards range, being shy but six points of a team possible at this distance with two of the members scoring possible and the remaining six being just one point away from perfect scores.

Glenn Cunningham expects to see his mile record of 4:06.7 cracked in the Princeton invitation meet on Saturday. He does not say he will do it himself, but perhaps Archie San Romani will do the trick over the fast Princeton track.

The J's, especially the Joe's, seem to have it in Chicago's big fight. There's Joe Louis, the challenger; Joe Foley, promoter; Joe Gould, Braddock's manager; Joe Trainer, chairman of the Illinois Commission; Jim Braddock, the champion; Mike Jacobs, adviser to Foley; John Roxborough and Julian Black, Louis' pilots; Jack Blackburn, his trainer; the fight's being held in J. Louis Comiskey's ball park and to make it complete, June's the month.

Precipitation Wins Feature At Ascot Meet

ASCOT, Berkshire, June 17—(CP Cable)—Lady Zia Wernher's Precipitation, the 2 to 1 favorite, won the historic Ascot gold cup today, covering the 2 1/2-mile distance in near record time to win by two lengths.

It was the first gold cup victory for a woman owner since Merman won for the famous actress, Lily Langtry, in 1900. Lady Zia is the daughter of Grand Duke Michael of Russia, a cousin of the late Czar Nicholas II.

Precipitation, a chestnut son of Hurry On-Double Life, was off the pace the better part of the long journey but two furlongs from home came up strongly under Pat Beasley's firm handling and passed Sir Abe Bailey's Ceclil to win handily.

Four lengths behind Ceclil, in third place, came Lord Stanley's gallant little filly Quashed, who was last at the halfway mark but came up strongly towards the finish. It was Quashed who won the race last year, defeating William Woodward's Omaha by the narrowest of margins.

Precipitation was clocked in 4:18 4/5, just 2 1/5 seconds slower than the gold cup record of 4:16 3/5 established by Golden Myth in 1922. Quashed's time last year was 4:33 3/5.

In other events on the day's card favorites and outsiders shared honors. Malcolm McAlpine's Diplomat, following his Fernhill Stakes victory yesterday, was made favorite at 7 to 4 for the Granville Stakes and won easily.

Sir Abe Bailey's Cambridgeshire winner Dan Bulger, starting a 2 to 1 favorite, beat Sir George Bullough's Daytona by a short head. Then the bookmaker's turn came when Sir Abe's Ramtapa, at 100 to 6 prevailed over his stable companion, Caerleioptic, at 13 to 2, by a head, with both the first and second favorites unplaced.

Two 10 to 1 shots, Arthur Cox's Flag of Truce and Sir Percy Lorraine's Spot Barred, ran a dead heat in the Waterford Stakes.

The Aga Khan got his daily winner as Perrozzah, at 10 to 1, took the Cork and Orrery Stakes. Totalizer takings were \$138,253 (\$678,930), a record for the third day. The four-day meeting will conclude tomorrow.

Louis Will Be No Sucker For A Right

KENOSHA, Wis., June 17—A bit of diligent detective work, climaxed by a long talk with the brown bomber and trainer Jack Blackburn, indicates Joe Louis is trying to build up James J. Braddock for a big let down next Tuesday night.

The dark man with the pin cushion lips and a dynamite-packed left looks as good as ever and his spirit is improved. Despite rumors to the contrary, he's taking orders like a young fighter should, with ideas of his own invincibility knocked forever from his head.

Joe Louis today looks like the fighter he was against Max Baer and Primo Carnera, only he isn't trying to convince the experts of it as he engages in workouts. His orders are to develop a cross-counter to a right and he thinks he has it about perfected. Look bad? It's okay with Joe who says he learned a year ago you can't win fights punching the daylight out of sparring partners.

"Who says I look bad?" asked Joe at his palatial camp by Lake Michigan. "You know I don't read much in the papers. Blackburn doesn't want me to and I don't, except for a peek now and then."

Blackburn motioned for me to come into the other room. "The boys think Joe is pretty bad, I hear," said Blackburn with a wink.

"Does Braddock read all that stuff? I hope so. Let me tell you, man, that I think Joe will not only be as good when he fights Braddock but a better Joe Louis than ever. He never trained as hard and so faithfully as he has for this fight. Schmeling taught him a lesson on over-confidence."

Braddock Plans Kayo Victory By Eighth

GRAND BEACH, Mich., June 17—A well-trained and supremely confident James J. Braddock sent out the word today that he'll knock out Joe Louis in eight rounds or less when they clash in Chicago next Tuesday night.

If the 31-year-old champion has any private misgivings as to his ability to come back after two years of idleness he is doing a swell job of keeping them to himself. He is the most unconcerned man in camp as he rounds into shape for the first defence of the title he won in his upset victory over Max Baer in 1935.

Jimmy would rather talk about anything except the fight, but when he is lured into a discussion of his chances against the brown bomber his frankness is refreshing.

"I look for a good tough fight," he said. "Maybe it will be the hardest fight I've ever had. I might even be belted to the deck a couple of times. But I'll get up and I'll knock Louis out."

"I'm not kidding myself about his ability to flatten anybody he hits squarely. But I don't believe he's good enough to knock me out. The boys have always found that was pretty tough to do."

Today was one of the good days for the champion who hasn't been anything to write home about in the past few drills. He boxed five rounds with as many sparring mates and showed the first traces of viciousness he has flashed since he started boxing five weeks ago.

NEW YORK, June 17—Pitchers came a dime a dozen at Yankee Stadium today as the world champion Yankees outslugged and outlasted Cleveland Indians to sweep the three-game series with a 9-7 victory.

Five home runs were hit, six pitchers saw service and 25 safe blows were collected before the Yanks finished on top to stretch their American League lead to 2 1/2 games.

Bump Hadley started for the New Yorkers and drew credit for his fourth win of the year, although Johnny Murphy took over the job in the eighth.

Home runs were contributed by Bill Dickey, George Selkirk and Frank Crosetti on the Yanks' behalf, and Hal Trosky and Earl Averill for the Tribe. Selkirk and Trosky each had three singles in addition to their round-trippers.

Boston Red Sox swept the four-game home-series with Chicago by taking both ends of a double header 5-2 and 3-2.

Jack Wilson allowed but five hits in the first game, when he gained his fourth win in six starts. The overtime double of Doc Cramer and Ben Chapman's single decided the second contest in Boston's favor.
