 er for the Air Service. George M. Chambers, also a defendant in the dead-end case, is now Director of Sales for the War Department, and John Stewart, a lumberman, of Jacksonville, Fla., were exonerated by a direct verdict at the close of the Government's case two weeks ago.

There were three other defendants in this case: Roland Perry, a Washington lumberman, who was granted a separate trial, but who probably will never be brought to trial; Gus Eltzen and A. Mitchell Touart, Jr., of the Eltzen-Touart Company, of Pensacola, Fla., who also were granted separate trials with a declaration by the Government that they would testify against the other defendants.

The Government also sued the defendants in equity for an accounting. It is expected now that, since the bottom has fallen out of the criminal phase of the lumber contracts, the civil case will not be pushed.

About 50,000,000 feet of lumber was involved in the case. John I. Phillips and John Stephens were alleged to have had an agency which they were to dispose of the surplus lumber and receive a commission of 12 per cent. They were alleged to have "worked both ends against the middle," that is, collected commissions, or graft money, from the purchaser and collected the regular commission from the Government.

The other defendants were charged with having acted in collusion to sell lumber for less than the price agreed upon and fixed by the Government.

The case had been on trial since May 2, and had taken weeks to be completed. The indictment was returned July 18, 1923.

"When the jury announced the verdict J. Butler Walsh, an attorney associated with some of the defense lawyers, applauded, and was ordered arrested by Justice Bailey.

country looking to the raising of the Red Flag over the White House.

Hughes has taken the strong position that he has on the question of Red propaganda not so much because he believes there is any great real danger that the flag will be hoisted over the White House, but rather as a matter of principle. Never before has the United States been called on to recognize a regime that is working to overthrow the American government, it is held here.

Matter of Principle

The American policy towards Russia is largely one of principle in the view of the Washington government. The United States is actuated at times by political expediency, like other countries. However, in the case of Russia there is held to be no compelling motive of expediency to cause this government to recognize Russia. There is an analogy in the attitude of Great Britain towards Mexico to the American attitude towards Russia.

Tuxis Boys Break Camp At Pownall

The Provincial Boys Camp held at Waterside Pownall was brought to a close yesterday afternoon. There were 25 boys and leaders from all over the province with Rev. Frank Milligan of Halifax as Camp Leader. Other leaders were Rev. J. S. Millett, North River; Rev. George Tilley, Pownall; Rev. H. H. Simpson, Summerside and Mr. R. A. Pendleton City; Rev. B. H. Stavers, Hunter River; and Mr. Lawson Jenkins, Mill View, were visiting leaders.

The camp was a re-organization of the Great Abegweit Tribe, subdivided into Micmacs, Mohawks and Hurons. Each tribe appointed a Big Chief who was one of the leaders and a Little Chief chosen from among the boys.

The duties and details of the camp were divided equally among the tribes and during the twelve days spent under canvas, a very intensive training course was participated in by all. The following subjects were taken up: Bible Study, Teacher Training, Nature Study, Camp Craft, First Aid, Swimming and Life Saving.

The daily programme was as follows: Rising whistle 7 a. m.; 7 to 7:15, morning watch, physical training and swim; 7 to 8, breakfast; 8:15 Chapel service, 8:45 Bible study; 9: Nature Study, first aid and leaders training and camp craft; 10 to 11: volley ball leagues and swim; 11 to 12 dinner 12:30; camp duties; 1 to 2; tent inspection 2:15; grand council big and little chiefs 2:30; baseball leagues and volley ball 3 to 4; swim 4 to 5 supper 6; evening baseball league, 6:30; 8:30 campfire and evening worship, 10-11:15 lights out.

This camp, the first in two years, was a most successful one from every viewpoint, although the number in attendance was somewhat small. The quality of those attending was however of high sading. It is felt that the boys will return home with a greater vision of the C. S. E. T. work and that the special training they received will do much to build up boys work throughout the Island.

Boxer Dies After Bout

MOOSEJAW, Sask., July 22.—William James Planes of Dunblane, Sask., returned a soldier and prize fighter died here last night as the result of injuries received in a bout Saturday night at the Assiniboia with Harry "Twist" (Young Runcorn) of Moosejaw. Medical attendants stated he suffered from a fracture at the base of the skull which produced an internal cranial hemorrhage. His young wife, formerly Miss Grace Wilks, an English girl, is a patient in the same hospital, prostrated with grief. The ending to Saturday's boxing exhibition throws for the second time, a cloud over the life of "Twist". Two years ago, in a bout here, a negro fighter known as "Handsome" Howard took an uppercut from Runcorn's fist, crashed to the canvas and died a few hours later. A fractured skull was the cause of death.
