SOME STARTLING UNITED STATES DIVORCE FIGURES.

Maine Heads the List With One Out of Every Six Marriages Dissolved.

Boston, Jan. 25.—At the annual meeting of the National League for the Protection of the Family, held yesterday afternoon at the Dineen house, Joy street, an interesting report was made by Dr. Samuel W. Dike, corresponding secretary of the league.

Dr. Dike said that the need of giving serious attention to the evils confronting home life is steadily increasing. Legislation of a more or less important character affecting the home has recently been passed in Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, North Dakota, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Vermont, District of Columbia and Utah. In other states unsuccessful attempts at legislation in various states also were given, and mention was made of the fact that in 1902 there were some 4,351 divorces granted in the six New England States and there appears to be a steady increase in all except Connecticut. According to the latest statistics available, there was one divorce to about every six marriages in Maine in 1902; one divorce to every 8.3 marriages in New Hampshire in the same year; one to every ten in Vermont; one to every sixteen in Massachusetts; one to every 8.4 in Rhode Island; one to every 8.8 marriages in Ohio; one to every 7.6 in Indiana; one to every eleven in Michigan. Statistics of divorce in foreign countries also were given.

WAR SITUATION STILL CRITICAL

But Russia Disposed to Make Concessions

Strange Incident in a Robbery—The Whitaker Wright Inquest—Sixty Bodies of Miners Rescued.

PARIS, Jan. 27.—(Special)—Official advices show the Russian Foreign Minister is conferring with the Japanese Minister over Russia's reply and that Russia will go to the limit to prevent war, but the situation is still critical.

M. Bacot the magistrate commissioner to investigate the robbery of \$80,000 from the Christian Brothers found his son was the thief and arrested him. The most of the money was recovered, so the Brothers will not prosecute.

LONDON, Jan. 27.—(Special)—The Inquest over Whitaker Wright will be held Thursday. The editorials of leading Liberal papers indicate that the failure of the Government to prosecute Wright will be used as a political weapon against the Government.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 27.—(Special)—Sixty bodies of the Hawick miners were recovered, mostly burned beyond recognition. The others are not found yet.
