TESTING CANNED EGGS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27—A new position may soon be advertised by the government, and civil examinations will follow. It is said that both men and women will be eligible, the only requirement being that the applicant have a good constitution and a not too acute sense of smell. The position will have to do with eggs; not of the garden variety, but a different brand of hen fruit which will be able to climb trees and write its name on the tallest cliffs. If any are as "fresh" as the dav on which they were laid, as it is claimed they will be, the government expert who holds the above mentioned position will undoubtedly receive the surprise of his life.

The position will require a knowledge of cans, nimble fingers and a good command of the English language, some of which is not found in text books. The applicant will be unable to wear fine clothes or associate in high society. He or she, whichever it may be, will have to restrain from marriage, live on an isolated ranch and have strong nerves, for it is said the "chickens" will walk, and that is no joke. In short, the U. S. government has attempted to accomplish the "very last word" in egg preserving. The government methods will be proven either a success or a failure at the experiment station at Puyallup, Wash this fall.

Eggs canned a year ago by a dozen different formulas will be opened up. Incubators will be placed nearby and a large corps of assistants will assist the holder of the coveted position, that of government "can opener." Providing that the experiment is a success, broilers will suffer a decline in price and even the laboring man's table will be graced by a hitherto unheard of delicacy. The housewife then can "put up" eggs when they are cheap just the same as she puts up fruit, and then along in the dead of winter, when the cans are frozen solid and the price of eggs per dozen is somewhere between 60 and 75 cents she will open a can of eggs and the family will enjoy "two over" or "ham-an" for breakfast just as if the delicacy were not a millionaire's luxury at that particular moment. Eggs will never be "out of season" and "poached on" and "two in a cup" will be dished at the leading restaurants.

But to get back to the government expert, it is said that the job will be full of perils. The life of such a plum holder is estimated at six months but the position will be handed down from father to son, or mother to daughter, until the race dies out and the populace turns once again to the barnyard. Who knows? Not such a rotten job at that.
