THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

We print today a further instalment of opinions from leading citizens in favor of an improved telegraph service. These opinions are unanimous—the GUARDIAN has met with no dissenting voice, no one who thinks our twelve-hour, high-rate service is sufficient. A number have expressed their views with much greater emphasis. It is needless to say that neither THE GUARDIAN nor those who have spoken through our columns have any other object than to secure for P. E. Island such a telegraph service by day and night as the people of the other Provinces enjoy.

The names affixed to the replies so far published are such as will command respect in the business world. They are of political weight sufficient to show the leaders of both parties that this matter can no longer be trifled with. And such outspoken sentiments from the principal patrons of the telegraph service on the Island ought to set the Anglo-American Telegraph Company to thinking seriously.

There is a report that a Russian army is marching toward Afghanistan. This may not be true. Correspondents in search of a sensation often set afloat reports which lack the essential element of truth. But no one puts any confidence in the Russian pretensions of a desire to maintain peace. And there is much apprehension lest there spring up a general European conflagration before the century closes.

The French have a fine squadron in Newfoundland waters, being composed of modern cruisers. Great Britain next year will probably send two modern cruisers to patrol these waters. 
