In referring to the scarcity of lumber in the Dominion of Canada an exchange says: "It is estimated that 25 per cent of the logs cut on the north shore of Lake Superior this winter will have to be left in the woods, as the season, on account of the lack of snow, has been very unfavorable. 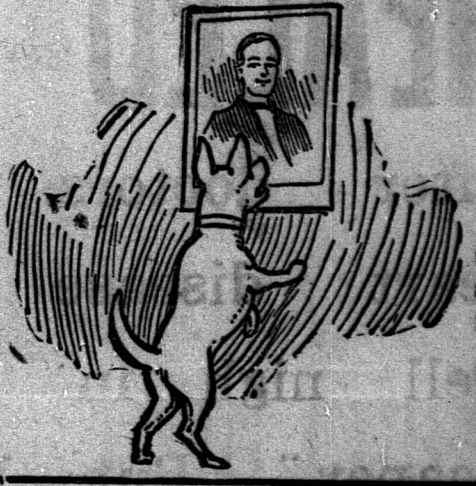
