In reply to an inquiry regarding the increased freight rates on the N. B. and P. E. I. Railway D. K. Currie, the Sec'y of the Summerside Board of Trade received from Hon. Senator Wood a letter which was read before the board at a special meeting held last night. Senator Wood says that the management were obliged to increase and re-adjust their local rates in order to meet changed conditions and increasing expenses. In the latter item is included a charge of 20c per item by the I. C. R. authorities for all cars which come on to N. B. and P. E. Island Railroad—A sum which amounts to about \$1200 a year. The increases, the Senator says, have not been large and are not likely to materially affect traffic. The increase in passenger rates will only be 15c; so far as through rates are concerned the management of the road are willing that the same arrangements shall continue as were agreed upon at a conference between the I. C. R. and the N. B. & P. E. I. Railway the first year the Stanley was put on the route. If the management of the I. C. R. and the P. E. I. R. assent to this there need be no chance whatever as far as through freight is concerned. The I. C. R. have made a general increase in their local rates and if it is decided that the through rates must also be increased they will be increased pro rata on the N. B. & P. E. I. R.

Indian summer is welcomed by all. The S. S. Lunenburg has arrived in port.

The S. S. Inverness, Capt. Wm. McDonald is in port.

The Rev. Mr. Tupper preached in English Church Sunday.

Schr Magno is loading trap bows, lumber, etc., for the Magdalen Islands.

Mrs. H. J. Mabon, Souris, will be at home Wednesday and Thursday afternoon of this week.

Schr. Abana, Capt. Lannigan, has arrived in port from Halifax with a general cargo and a deck load of kerosene oil.

Two large schooners left last week for Boston carrying about 12,000 bushels potatoes loaded by Matthew & McLean.

Frank and Wm Hennessey, St. Catharines arrived home from the lumber woods where they have been for the past few months.

Sch. Mary Joseph, Capt. McArthur, has arrived from Pictou with a load of coal making a record trip there and back in thirty two hours.

Three or four small schooners are in port waiting to be discharged of their cargo of potatoes which they have brought from Annandale, Fortune and Grand River.

The Souris Citizens Band intend opening the skating rink and preparations will soon be made to get it in readiness. Everything will be renovated and fixed up in first class style. The Band have been practicing for the last two months and have choice and well selected music to render and everything will be arranged conveniently for many patrons.

This will likely be a very busy week here. The farmers will take advantage of the vessels in port loading potatoes, large quantities of which are still in the country.

The only fishing vessel in port now is the Yukon. She arrived Sunday evening with from 20 to 24 quintals fish. Fish is reported plentiful, the only drawback being the scarcity of bait.

The market prices remain about the same as ever. Potatoes dropped 3 cents a bushel,—18 cents a bushel at the cellars but they will likely be 20 cents at the wharf when they begin to load.

The large three masted schooner, Golden Rule, Capt. Nickerson, Shelburne, has arrived in port to load potatoes for Matthew & McLean. She will take between eight and nine thousand bushels.

The fine weather of the last week gave the shore fishermen a chance to try their luck and some very fine catches were made all along the shore. Friday and Saturday were their banner days. The only bait available now is capelin which is caught in the ponds.

It is high time something was done to our town pump in the upper part of the town. It has been out of order for the last two months, and we are as far away as ever from getting it repaired. What are we paying town taxes for? Is it not for those convenient improvements in our town? Now, wardens, wake up and attend to those things. If a fire should break out some night in the upper end where are you going to get water to keep the tank replenished? It is understood the other pumps are in fairly good order. The sidewalks are another stumbling block in our midst. We will have to wait till the snow covers them so we can have good walking.

**Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.**

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Province, excepting 8 and 36, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is 18 or more years of age, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
