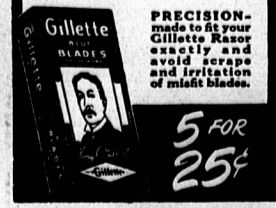

Awarded The Military Cross

NORTH EASTON, Mass., Nov. 10.—Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth W. Finlayson have received an interesting citation from the French government for their son, Staff Sergeant Kenneth E. Finlayson, who is serving with the U. S. Army artillery command in Sicily at present. The citation, which came from the army at Algiers, was in French and another son, Keir, brought it to school and his French teacher graciously translated it.

It was sent by General Giraud of the army command of the French and Civil Military Affairs and reads as follows: "This citation is awarded to Staff Sergeant Kenneth E. Finlayson, a member of a unit group to insure the assignment of American materials to French army at Algiers and employed as an adviser. He showed competence and devotion to duty, which constituted an appreciable aid to the army of France." It was awarded at Algiers.

Staff Sgt. Finlayson was graduated from Medford High School and was employed as a shipper at Littleboro. He was one of the first in the town to be called to duty and after training at Fort Bragg went overseas more than a year ago. He has served in Ireland, Africa, Algiers and now in Sicily.

(Staff Sgt. Finlayson was born in Summerside and lived in this city until 9 years ago, when the family removed to the United States. His father was at one time employed as accountant with Bruce Stewart & Co. He is a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Finlayson, 198 Hillsboro Street.)

WINTHROP, Mass., Nov. 10.—(CP)—Funeral services for Benjamin Howatt, 52, native of Cape Traverse, P.E.I., and a retired member of the Winthrop Police Department, who died Saturday, were held Monday from a Funeral Home.

He came to the United States from Prince Edward Island 34 years ago. He retired 18 years ago from the Police Force. In 1921 he was awarded a medal by the Humane Society of Massachusetts for saving an 11-year-old boy from drowning in Lewis Lake, Winthrop.

Besides his wife, Mrs. Jennie (MacKenzie) Howatt, he leaves a son, W. Harold Howatt, a Springfield insurance man; a daughter, Mrs. Mabel H. Hurley of Brookline; a brother, William J., and a sister, Elizabeth MacPherson, both of Cape Traverse, P.E.I.

De Marigny Trial Approaches Close

NASSAU, Bahamas, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The trial of De Marigny was captured today by the Crown as a scheming killer, who did away with his father in law in an effort to get his hands on a great fortune.

The greater fortune was that of an innocent man who is the victim of a faked evidence.

Attorney general Eric Hallinan said today that the trial of De Marigny is gully of murder in connection with the bludgeon and torch slaying of Sir Henry Oakes, a Canadian millionaire, on July 2.

Nancy Oakes De Marigny, wife of the accused man, listened with rapt interest to Higgs' declaration that the testimony against her husband is "a combination of statements of an irrelevant nature and deliberate lying by police officers whose duty is to protect the public."

But she got up suddenly and hurried from the courtroom this afternoon when the attorney general testified that her husband's father apparently was struck four times on the head by an attacker who invaded his bedroom and that he leaves his bed at night.

Hallinan did not complete his argument and will be permitted to speak for one more hour tomorrow before the chief justice, Cesar Bedford Daly delivers his charge to the jury.

Tugging at the collar of his black robe, Higgs cried his attack on the fingerprint—exhibit B—which Capt. James O. Barker of the Miami Police said he lifted from a bedchamber in the bedroom of the Oakes estate, Westbourne, where the assault took place during the early morning hours of July 2. It is an impression of De Marigny's right little finger.

Higgs charged again, just as he did earlier in the trial that the fingerprint was faked.

The defence alleges, and Higgs voice here was loud and strong, "that the accused was taken upstairs for the purpose of getting his fingerprint on some object."

Higgs insisted that De Marigny had established conclusively, and that the accused was at the time of the slaying in a house five miles away.

Higgs' witnesses' stories, he declared, show that "it was absolutely impossible for the accused to have murdered Sir Henry."

Naval Casualties

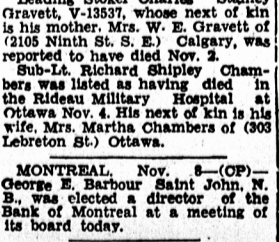

obtained, he said, was due in large part to the work of Col. MacKinnon, who was also instrumental in keeping the Provincial Exhibition going during wartime.

Judge's Commendation

Mr. Callbeck warned that Island foxmen would find stiff competition from other provinces, and that no effort should be spared to maintain the high prestige.

In the classes so far judged, he could not say that the standard silvers had any more top animals than in previous years, but that the marked classes were much superior to the classes he had judged two years ago. This was important, Mr. MacLeod conveyed greetings from Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture, and others interested in fox breeding in that province. He warmly commended the management of the exhibition, and said there was evidence of "tremendous improvement" in the new classes.

Dr. Dunn and Mr. Todd in their remarks both gave important advice in handling a current ailment in platinum foxes.

Mr. Clark stressed the necessity of providing a first class provincial field man for the fox industry.

President MacKinnon warmly commended the work of the Association of New Brunswicks, and urged the importance of the forthcoming fall show in January. In introducing the secretary, Mr. Shaw, he warmly commended his untiring energy and ability.

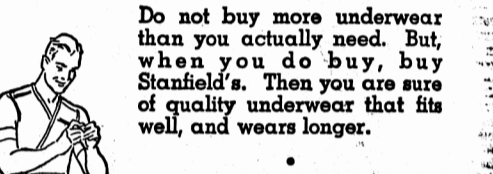
