MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

At Charlottetown, and within St. James' Hall there on Tuesday, August 7th, 1906, and at 11 o'clock forenoon, which place and date the Presbytery of Prince Edward Is. met in quarterly session, and was constituted, Mr. W. H. Spencer, moderator, with whom were present Messrs A. S. Stewart, J. W. McKenzie, T. F. Fullerton, D. McLean, Geo. Millar, A. Craise, H. G. Gratz, R. G. Sinclair, E. J. Rattee, M. N. McLeod, M. E. McIntosh, E. McDonald, W. A. Mason, E. Smith, G. C. Robertson, A. D. Sterling, S. D. McPhee, ministers, and Daniel McLaren, J. J. McLeod, D. J. Campbell and D. McInnis, elders.

Minutes of meetings held on May 8th, June 18th, and July 25th were read and sustained. Mr. John Murray was elected moderator for the ensuing six months. Rev. D. B. McLeod, R. L. Coffin, and W. B. McNeill were invited to sit and correspond. Correspondence in regard to Globe Land at Cavendish was read; also replies from Members of Parliament acknowledging receipt of Presbytery's resolution re-specting the Lord's Day Act. Presbytery considered the claim of Mr. Colin G. Townsend for two Sabbath's supply at Marshfield. The clerk was instructed, on motion, to apply to the Home Mission Board in behalf of Mr. Townsend for a grant of \$14.

Elders' commissions were received from the following sessions: Summerside, Valleyfield, West Cape, Georgetown, Murray Harbor South, Wood Islands, Caledonia, Richmond Bay East, Covehead, Montague, Dundas, Cavendish, Malpeque, Strathalbyn, East St. Peter's, and Alberton. In favor of Messrs Douglas Gordon, Charles McKinnon, Daniel Rieley, Wm. McConnell, Angus McLeod, Daniel McLaren, John McDonald, G. W. Carr, Alex. McCallum, D. J. Campbell, Samuel Robertson, John E. Craige, Joel McLeod, Oliver Anderson, and Hon. B. Rogers, respectively, and their names were ordered to be placed on the roll of the Presbytery. The clerk read the resignation of Mr. M. H. McIntosh of the pastoral charge of West and Clyde Rivers, and stated that the Session and Congregation has been cited to appear for their interests at this meeting. The action of the clerk was approved. The following commissioners were present: Messrs McMillan, Wright, McLean, and McKenzie, and spoke of the attachment of the congregation to their pastor and expressed the wish that he remain among them. W. McIntosh adhered to his resignation, which on motion, was accepted to take effect on and after the 25th August instant. Mr. Geo. Millar was appointed interim moderator of the session of West and Clyde Rivers, and instructed to declare the pulpit vacant.

Presbytery took up resignation of Mr. Even McDonald of the pastoral charge of Cavendish and Stanley. The clerk intimated that the Session and Congregation had been cited to appear for their interests at this meeting. The conduct of the clerk was sustained. Mr. T. F. Fullerton presented a resolution from the congregation commending the work of their pastor. Mr. McDonald adhered to his resignation, which on motion was accepted to take effect on and after the 10th day of August inst. Mr. A. D. Sterling was appointed interim moderator of the session of Cavendish and Stanley, and instructed to declare the pulpit vacant.

The resignation of Mr. A. D. McDonald of the pastoral charge of Tryon, Hampton and Bonshaw was read. The resignation was laid on the table and the clerk instructed to cite the session and congregation to appear for their interests at a meeting of Presbytery to be held in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, 28th August instant, at 11 o'clock a. m. It was moved by Mr. J. F. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. S. D. McPhee, and carried that a representative committee be appointed to take into consideration the state of the church within the bounds and to bring in a report with such recommendations as said committee may deem suitable. The following were appointed to act on that committee: Messrs T. F. Fullerton, convener, Geo. Millar, Wm. McDonald, W. A. Mason, E. J. Rattee, R. S. Sinclair, A. S. Stewart, J. W. McKenzie, E. Smith, ministers, and Wm. Brown, Hugh McMillan, Geo. L. Simpson and Captain McLaren, elders. This report to be laid before Presbytery on August 28th.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the same place at half-past two o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this seditant closed with the benediction. Same place and date, and at half past two o'clock Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted, Mr. W. H. Spencer moderator pro tempore. Seditant ut supra. A letter was read from Dr. Robert Campbell, Clerk of General Assembly, stating that the application by the Presbytery of P. E. I. that the Rev. John Sutherland be allowed to retire and that he be placed on the aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund had been granted.

Mr. A. D. McDonald's resignation of the trusteeship of the Presbyterian Fund was laid on the table to be considered on 28th instant. The clerk read the report of the Presbyterial W. F. M. Society. On motion the report was received and gratification expressed at success of past years, and the work of Society commended. The following resolution was moved by Mr. E. J. Rattee seconded by Mr. R. G. Sinclair, and carried: In view of the recommendation of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church
