

GEO. MARSTON DIED BY POISON GIVEN BY ONE OF HIS HOUSEHOLD

So the Coroner's Jury Affirm. Mrs. Marston Arrested Charged With the Crime.

THE REVOLVER FOUND WHICH KILLED DOHERTY

Goodspeed Guides Police to the Spot—Pistol was Empty—Theories Confirmed by the Discovery—Goodspeed's Life was in Danger—Knights of Pythias Decorate Brothers' Graves.

MARSTON WAS POISONED.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Aug. 14.—(Special)—The verdict in the Marston poisoning case was that the late Geo. M. Marston came to his death through strychnine poisoning administered by an inmate or inmates of his household.

MRS. MARSTON ARRESTED.

Mrs. Marston was arrested by Constable Allen Dowe, of Meductic, and was admitted to bail in \$4,000.

The preliminary examination will be held on the 18th inst.

THE DEADLY REVOLVER FOUND.

St. JOHN, Aug. 14.—(Special)—Shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon the revolver

used by Frank Higgins in killing Wm. Doherty, in the Park on August 1, was found.

GOODSPEED GUIDED THE POLICE.

Young Goodspeed who squealed on Higgins took the police to the spot in Courtney Bay Creek where Higgins threw the pistol.

REVOLVER EMPTY—A THEORY.

The revolver was empty, which strengthens the theory held that if Higgins had another bullet he would have killed Goodspeed.

The Knights of Pythias decorated their dead brother's graves to-day.

CHANGES IN GOVERNMENT RAILWAY STAFF

Moncton Transcript Says Offices of E. G. Russell and E. T. Horn are Abolished—They Leave the Service—Other Changes Follow—Money Saved in Salaries.

MR. POTTINGER'S CONTROL ENLARGED

MONCTON, Aug. 14.—(Special)—The Transcript makes the announcement presumably authorized, that David Pottinger remains General Manager of the Government Railways with his personal control restored over the departments which were managed by E. G. Russell.

E. G. RUSSELL RESIGNS.

The latter has resigned his office as Manager of the Intercolonial which has been abolished together with that of Assistant Manager, held by E. T. Horn.

TWO LARGE SALARIES STOPPED.

The combined salaries of those gentlemen were over ten thousand dollars.

Both leave the Intercolonial service.

FORMER OFFICE RE-ESTABLISHED.

The office of General Superintendent is re-established with J. E. Price restored thereto.

MR. PRICE'S SUCCESSOR.

Mr. Price is succeeded as District Superintendent at Campbellton by Evan Price, Chief Train Despatcher.

His brother H. A. Price is District Passenger Agent at Montreal.

CHANGES WILL SAVE \$6,000 YEARLY.

Some minor readjustments will place the total effect of which is to save about \$6,000 a year.
