Men's suits to Undergo changes

OTTAWA, March 4 — (CP) — Double-breasted suits and Norfolk jackets will be things of the past when strict clothing regulations, designed to conserve Canadian wool and textile supplies, come into effect, it was learned today. Men's vests will be conservative. The back strap, the inside breast pocket and special pencil pocket will disappear. There will be no double-breasted vests. Limiting the material which may be used in a suit coat, its length may be no more than 29 1/2 inches in size 38, with comparable lengths for other sizes. The inside trouser leg may not be longer than 35 inches unless the

wearer is so tall that this would give him a peculiar appearance. In such case special concession would probably be made. The length of women's skirts, governed by fashion edicts in the past, may have to conform to precise measurements. The prospect was that to conserve supplies of materials short skirts would be encouraged, with the lengths allowed for different sizes set forth specifically. It was expected the rulings on conservative clothing would be effective in respect to fall styles.

WASHING TIPS To restore completely the attractive freshness of your new bias cut slip, "dip" it in safe gentle suds and take care to iron the "bias-cut" sections at an angle. Always follow the direction of the threads. To iron against the bias is apt to give your slip an uneven, warped appearance and make the hemline irregular.

QUEEN'S CANADIAN FUND DONATIONS

Repeated bombing raids on British port areas and the industrial Midlands has attracted fresh attention to the rightful suffering of the many thousands of civilians in Great Britain who are harried from shelter to shelter and finally driven into the open country by successive raids. Eventually places are found for them all, places of relative security, but their belongings of all kinds are destroyed. The task of emergency feeding alone is difficult. The task of setting them up once more with some quantity of clothing and bedding is much more difficult. To meet these enormous needs, funds have been started in various parts of the world. Her Majesty's Government has followed by further reverses, but insisted that "modern war, on the gigantic and factious scale upon which it now is being waged, is not finally won or lost as the result of territorial gains here or there." "It eventually will be won by the resources in manpower and material that can be mobilized behind one side or the other," the former ambassador to Russia and new lord privy seal in the war cabinet declared.

U. S. Destroyer Lost; Only 11 Are rescued

CAPE MAY, N.J., March 3 —(G.P.)—Eleven men, presumably the only survivors of the United States destroyer Jacob Jones, torpedoed and sunk by an axis submarine, have been landed here, the navy disclosed today. Eleven others lost their lives as they fought against darkness, cold and the Atlantic Ocean aboard life rafts. All others apparently perished in two explosions which tore bow and stern from the destroyer.
