DIED AT THE FRONT.—Mrs. W. H. Pethick of this city has received the news of the death of her cousin, Lieut. H. J. Vicat, of the Royal West Kent Regiment which occurred while on active service in the present European War. Lieut. Vicat was a son of the late Hon. Arthur Vicat of London, England, and a great grandson of the late Right Hon. Major Holland of Quebec.

POWDERY SCAB.—Mr. John Adams, Assistant Dominion Botanist, came to the island on Wednesday night to look into the matter of powdery scab. Mr. Adams had considerable experience with the disease in Ireland, where he was born, and he made a special study of it for the Irish Department of Agriculture. Two years ago powdery scab was discovered in the province and last year the United States Department of Agriculture placed an embargo upon potatoes from the island entering the United States. The Dominion Department has since taken the matter up with the United States, and after a special conference of Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, and the Deputy Minister and Mr. Adams it was decided that Mr. Adams should come to the province and point out to the farmers the pernicious nature of the disease, give directions for eradicating it and instruct the farmers on the best methods for keeping their potatoes free of it. A few meetings will be held at central points in the province and every means will be taken to enable the farmers fully to inform themselves on the disease. It is pleasing to note that the representations that have been made at Washington are likely to result in the embargo being lifted under certain conditions.
