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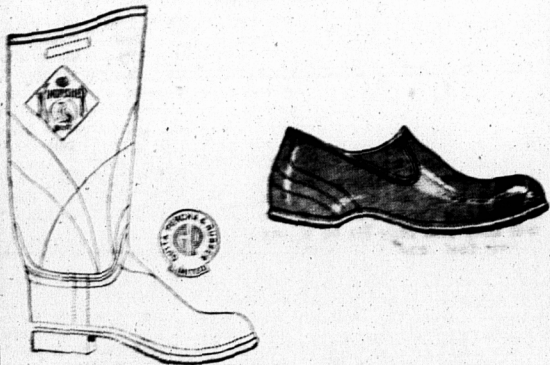

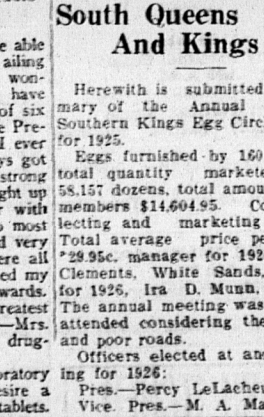

## MALPEQUE

A band of ladies comprising a number of members from each of the three auxiliaries of Princeton congregation assembled at the Malpeque, Malpeque on Friday afternoon, Feb. 26th to hold the prayer service which has become an indispensable part of the years programme in connection with the society. The meeting was under the splendid leadership of Mrs. A. N. Gillis who in a concise manner explained the nature of the meeting. The idea of first originated in Canada and the United States in denominational groups, but there was no real satisfaction until the sectarian groups became a unified force, seeking guidance on the problems of the year. The programme suggested for general use was adopted and the different parts were taken by two representatives from each of the three auxiliaries. Miss Maude Donald, Sea View and Mrs. Peter MacNutt Darnley addressed the meeting on the Home and Foreign field respectively. Miss Donald in her review of the work in the Home land showed that one third of the six hundred thousand women connected with the United Church of Canada are members of the mission societies. Miss Donald pointed out that one million and a half of our people are non-Anglo-Saxon and if our civilization is to be saved it must be permeated with the religion of Jesus Christ. Miss MacNutt and Mrs. J. K. MacNutt representing Malpeque and Baltic auxiliary presented the condition, needs and possibilities of China. Prayer for homes and youths of all nations and for KING Country and Empire were given by Mrs. F. J. Lockery and Mrs. Lee O'Connell representing the Hamilton auxiliary. These numbers were interspersed with music, among them being a duet by Mrs. L. D. MacNutt and Mrs. Wallace MacNutt and a solo by Miss Clara Donald, while Mrs. Jas. A. Camp acted as accompanist. Ever bell acted as organist. Mrs. A. N. Gillis was asked to take the part "The League of Nations and the peace of Locarno" he referred to the fact that the League of Nations had been formed to replace the old spirit of Balkanization with the spirit that sought the common welfare of the nations. The Versailles treaty was touched upon and the hopes of Locarno as given by Sherwood Eddy were emphasized. Referring to the five great outstanding problems confronting the world today, namely, Economic, Political, Racial, International and Spiritual, Mr. Gillis noted considerable progress along these lines as the result of the Locarno treaties. There is a growing demand for peace, the inter-relationships of nations and the brotherhood of humanity, and it is realized that the religion of Jesus Christ is the only solution of all problems. In the course of his remarks Mr. Gillis quoted the beautiful lines entitled "Locarno" by Frederick George Scott.

### I. O. D. E.

Report of the I. O. D. E. Acting Secretary of Education for Prince Edward Island 1925. In reviewing the work of the past year I may say I have found the work intensely interesting, very much worth while, with the marked purpose of honouring our heroic dead by planning and working for the building up of our country through the high ideals of its citizenship on the War Memorial. Miss May Gardiner, daughter of the late Alfred Gardiner of St. Georges, who was killed at Arras in 1918, is completing the first year of her B. A. Course. On the 25th of the Provincial Committee of Selection, the National War Memorial Committee granted that our Bursary-holders could take their Freshman University work at Prince of Wales College as it was less expensive and equally as satisfactory. Miss Gardiner has availed herself of this privilege. Next September she will proceed to a University to complete her studies.

In order that all eligible candidates for the Bursaries in this Province may be secured, a complete survey of the children of men who were killed, or totally disabled in the Great War, has been made. Lists received from the Pensions Board at Ottawa show they are about fifty such children, who may in time be ready for a Bursary. At present there is no candidate in sight for next year. The mothers or guardians of these children are being circularized concerning the Bursaries and urged to keep the children at school if possible so they may later be able to enjoy the more than most prized gifts of the I. O. D. E.

The Overseas Scholarship for 1926 has been awarded to Mr. Mark Inman, son of Mr. Peter Inman of Argyle Shore, and a graduate of the University. Mr. Inman has had a brilliant record in his studies, graduating with honours in History in 1925. In 1916 he enlisted in the 10th Siege Battery but owing to his age and minor physical defects, he was rejected. Later he joined the Royal Air Force with which he served till the end of the war. We heartily congratulate Mr. Inman on winning this much prized scholarship, and predict for him a successful year in his work abroad. Mr. Inman will continue his study in History and English at Oxford next September probably remaining another year at his own expense to secure a degree.

During the year the War Memorial pictures have been placed as follows: The five pictures on hand from the year were framed at a cost of \$10 and are hanging in the Navy League building, Charlottetown. Two sets of eighteen pictures each are being sent to us from the Province of Quebec. One complete set has been awarded to Kennington, High School and also \$15 of the money allotted for that purpose to help
