I regret that a few teachers have not been very prompt in returning books borrowed. According to the rules set down in the Library Catalogue, books are loaned for a period of one month, yet some teachers have kept books in their possession for several months. This is unfair to other teachers who in the meantime may be asking for the loan of these same books. At any rate, I think one month is time enough for the reading of any one of these books, or in fact any book. Again, some books have been lost while in possession of the borrower, and as a result the Library is now the poorer by five or six of its original volumes. Further, some do not take the same care of books as others do. No pen or pencil marks should be made on any books, nor should the corners of leaves be turned down or pages soiled when turning over leaves. In fine, no books should be defaced, torn or injured beyond reasonable wear. Now I trust, teachers, that you will continue to make the very best use of this library, that you will take the best possible care of the books, so that the library may serve future generations of teachers long after you and I have passed from the educational arena of this Province.
