LONDON, Nov. 21.—Scotland Yard in addition to these precautions began to take extreme precautions today to prevent any act of violence from marring the wedding, Nov. 29, of Princess Marina and the Duke of Kent. The Greek Princess, soon to become the Duchess of Kent, will be given protection from the time of her arrival on the wedding day, in addition to 8,000 uniformed police, there will be about 6,000 special constables on duty in the metropolitan area. The Yard announced that, while extreme precautions are being taken, they are not more so than those taken at other equal occasions. The task of guarding the Duke of Kent is being continued by a Scotland Yard Reserve Office, where young Welsh officer, sergeant Evans is being sent to check them. Agencies which have purchased whole blocks of window seats have been asked to take the names and night addresses of all purchasers.

SPENDING \$500,000 ON AIR TEST-TUBE (By The Canadian Press) LANGLEY, B.C., Nov. 21.—Stresses and strains in aeroplanes flying 500 miles an hour will be studied here when the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics completes its new wind tunnel. Actually under construction, the gigantic new tube of concrete and steel is 16 feet in diameter and will cost almost \$500,000. An 8,000-horsepower motor will operate the propeller that is to set air moving in its eight-foot throat. Remote control devices will make it possible for observers to operate all the machinery from within the test chamber in the inside of the tunnel. Temperatures are expected to be so high, because of the friction, that observers will work for only a few minutes at a time.

When's A Bottle Of Gin Not A Bottle Of Gin (A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20.—Federal judges will be asked to decide whether a bottle of gin is a bottle of gin or just a bottle with gin in it. Assistant United States Attorney General Joseph R. Jackson is here to uphold in customs' court the United States Government's contention that the bottle and the gin are two separate things. Large quantities of gin are imported on the Pacific coast from the Philippines. The customs collector held that while the gin could come in free, a 1-4 cent duty must be paid on the bottles. The importer holds that a bottle of gin is an entity and that the bottles were made in the United States, shipped to Manila and returned.

ANOTHER BLOW DEALT PARLEY
LONDON, Nov. 20.—The outlook for the tri-power naval conversations became gloomier this morning, with a Japanese declaration that in the very likely event of failure to reach an agreement on tonnage limitation of navies, she could not agree to limitation of specific types of vessels and their gunpower. This was taken to mean that a tri-power agreement on total tonnage is not reached, replacing the Washington Treaty which Japan is going to denounce, then Japan is prepared to experiment with vessels she believes peculiarly suited to her needs. The Japanese made themselves very clear today, removing some misconceptions which had been plain the best the British and Americans can hope for, so far as the tripartite agreement is concerned, is to salvage as much as they can of the Washington agreement. And there does not seem to be much that can be saved.

Transmission Wireless Beacon Is Tested

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Nov. 20.—Over 400 miles of land telephone lines and out to sea for another 600 miles went the voice of C. H. Hosterman, Halifax agent of the Department of Marine, today to a wireless operator sitting in the cramped cabin of a trawler off distant Sable Island. "Marshfield calling," said the operator when Mr. Hosterman answered the phone's summons in his office; and soon he was talking to the radio telephone station at Marshfield, Mass. A brief talk there, and his voice was switched out to sea. Off Sable Island's shoals, the American trawler Thomas Whalen was cruising. Aboard her was H. B. Coxhead, a laboratory engineer studying marine wireless transmission for the United States Bureau of Lighthouses. The Bureau had sent him out to find out the ways and whereabouts of congestion on certain wavelengths in the broadcasting of bearings to mariners.

Three Elect Speedy Trial

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 20.—Seven witnesses testified today in the case of the Crown vs. Andrew Richard, Anthony, Willis MacDougall and Percy MacKenzie, both of Moncton, who appeared in the County Court before Judge John A. Barry. All three are standing trial under the Speedy Trials on charges of conspiracy to defraud, resulting from the alleged theft of an automobile. The case will continue tomorrow. Testimony was heard today from Mrs. Leonard King, Alphonse King, Albert King, all of St. Anne; Alfred Gillespie, E. A. Keyes and Mrs. Rachel Burden, Moncton, and Lawrence Cottingham, of Saint John and Montreal. Keyes, an insurance agent, said MacKenzie had secured a policy involving the car and after it was reported stolen had made a claim for compensation. This claim had not been paid.
