beneath the wide-spreading shelter there were knolls where Jamie and I might sit comfortably to enjoy our apples or on the needle-strewn spaces beside stretch out to ease aching "earth-bound" muscles. Here it is then and in an effort for "law and order" about all of our fields that the woodsmen go to their labors. And Jamie told me of a clearing fire, on the road which now runs through the field, that burned to a cinder and not one team moved there. Fuel wood and a bit of lumber will be taken from the cuttings and only I shall find the place - if neat when one day I shall come to view it.

Many of this week's days were grey and snow came gently falling. But one morning footstep crunched noisily in passing along the wintry pathways and a bright sparkling trail led to the gateway of the sun. The rare sunsets were beautiful, perhaps more noticeable because of their rarity, lovely too in colorful contrast to the white slopes and darkly wooded hillsides. And one morning when Jamie was our guest, we found that during the night every tree and shrub and post and vine had been decorated richly with a feathery lightness as beautiful as hoar frost, and Jamie and grand-daughter and her mother broke trails laughingly in the mid-morning prevailing.

Indoors, in quiet days I found exceedingly pleasant but which for James went all too slowly, there was time for knitting and mending, time to read - or time like tonight to think of friends near and far. To remember in thoughts the many not so fortunate as those of us at Alderlea able to go to our various interests, but whose activities have been interrupted by illness or accident. Those in hospital, finding it staffed by kindly folk and yet longing for the day of homing to be reunited with their own folk about the hearth fires of home. One who has spent some weeks of hospitalization recently and has managed, I'm sure, to keep her waking hours from being too tedious shares this verse with me:

"There's a bit of inspiration, In the dullest sort of day, And words of gleaming sunshine, Behind the clouds of gray; There are golden hours of smiling, For every heart-wrung tear, And deep reserves of courage, To meet each haunting fear. So be of courage, O my friend, Let not your spirit fall, Find for yourself inspiring things, That gloom cannot assail."

Literature And Life By BOOKMAN

BURNS - THE MAN There are various angles from which you may look at Burns, for instance, his relation to literature, to which he restored passion. Or his spontaneity as a song writer, or he is a voice for certain moods. A song writer may have almost as much influence on the morals of a country as a lawmaker. When Lord Byron landed in the United States some years ago, newsmen asked him what he thought of the U. S. A., needed most. The reply was a surprise for he said simply this: "Poets." Shelley said in his famous essay on Poetry that when in a nation the moral condition lags behind the physical, what the people need is the stimulus of the poet. These are angles from which Burns has been surveyed. But let us look at him as a man. He was great as a poet but great as a man, and it was as a man that he impressed the literati in Edinburgh in 1786. Hazlitt said this about him: "He was as great as Shakespeare as a man, but not the twentieth as great as Shakespeare as a poet." Carlyle said he was "the greatest man born in all the British lands in that century, and that this great soul came before the people as a hard-handed son of toil." It was said, too, by Hazlitt that if he were to shake hands with you you might feel your hand burn. Walter Scott at the age of fifteen met him and later said he never saw such eyes in a human head.

Burns had a fondness for common people, and we are told that hostlers would get out of bed early to hear him talk when they heard that he would be in the neighbourhood. He was a voice for the common man, and in this he had some of the spirit of the Man of Nazareth. It is true that his conduct was not all that could be desired, but no one knew that better than did he, and sadly did he "rue it."

He was brought up in Presbyterian Scotland and often had to answer for his conduct to the kirk session - a body that had some authority. Today most sessions, if they have any authority, do not exert it. He had a heart of pity, and the lines to a "daisy" and to a "mouse" whose nest his ploughshare broke up are dripping with his heart's pity. The winter storm makes him think of an old pitiful, the cattle and silly sheep, or the traveller beating his way home through the drifts, and the icy wind on his face.

Burns was essentially a singer. He was a reed which nature used, and through his lips she uttered strains that still echo in many places between Ayr by the Doon and the coal mines of our Canadian west. In all the history of song it is hard to find one whose lips and in whose heart are to be found greater evidence of the divine fire. A great critic bade a writer not to lay too much stress on the technique of art (a rhyming dictionary for instance will never make a poet) but to look into your own heart and write.

Burns was a big man - big physically, and knew what it meant to follow the plough all day. He was big intellectually and could hold his own in conversation with the intellectuals of such a city as Edinburgh.

Who born in such lowly circumstances as was he 189 years ago is now as well known as he? After all words do last, especially if they have been minted in such a soul as that of Burns. Propaganda cannot do it. It is the verdict of time that counts in the long run. Keats, whose recognition was slow said: "I shall be among the English poets when I die." The supreme arbiter after the shouting dies and the sky clears, will see that what is worth preserving shall be looked after. Burns has stood the test. Some one has said that the clay out of which he was formed was thick with diamonds. As a man who was close to our hearts - this man "who walked in glory and in joy following his plough along the mountain side."
